Strange But True

Different nations claim the invention of the art of knitting. But just when or where it actually began is not definitely established.

The earliest known use of the crocheting needle for lace was by the nuns of a convent in Ireland and that the first piece of file, crocheted, a copy of Da Vinci's last supper, was made by a nun of the Convent of Mercy, near Rouen, France.
