**Came Just 12 Years After**

TOKYO (Reuters) - Atomic power for peaceful purposes came to Japan this year just 12 years after the atomic bombs fell on Hiroshima and Nagasaki.

A 50-kilowatt experimental water boiler type reactor purchased in the United States began operating in August at Tokai village on the east coast of Honshu about 60 miles north of Tokyo. Japan thus became the second

country in Asia, after India, to possess and operate an atomic reactor.

The Japanese Atomic Energy Research Institute has prepared a list of 300 projects for research with the aid of the reactor.

**COURIER ADMITTED**  
DAMASCUS, Syria AP) - An American diplomatic courier banned from Syria was admitted into the country Wednesday. James Anthony Vericos was ordered by Syrian frontier officials last Monday to return to Beirut, Lebanon, after Syrian visas in his diplomatic passport were stamped "cancelled." Foreign ministry sources said a "misunderstanding over Vericos' visa" has been settled.

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
