Second Original Play Presented At Festival

BROCKVILLE, Ont. (CP)—The second of two original Canadian plays, both by French-Canadian authors, was to be presented at the Dominion Drama Festival Tuesday night.

The play "Les Nouveaux Dieux" (the new gods) by Jacques Duchesne of Montreal, won the Western Quebec regional festival earlier this year. The Quebec competition was the first in Dominion Drama Festival history to stage only new Canadian scripts.

The other original play, "H" (H) by Denis Saint-Denis of Montreal, was seen at the festival Sunday night. It is not competing, but its company, F.A.R.I.U.M. of Montreal, was invited to attend because festival directors felt the play was of special merit.

"Les Nouveaux Dieux," which defies most theatrical conventions, shocked many in the audience at the regional festival with its irreverent reference to almost every aspect of modern society.

The 35-year-old author, is a militant non-conformist who was a fisherman in Mexico and a seller of hot tamales in New Orleans before he began writing plays five years ago.

Mr. Duchesne also said he believes people in the French-Canadian theatre are more personally involved than those in the English-Canadian theatre.

"The young people in the cast give their whole souls to a production. After the play is over, they are not the same. They have changed."

Although he said he believes many plays, including those written in Quebec today, are created to express political ideas, the poetry of drama will last long after its political message has been forgotten.

The week-long drama festival, which began in 1932, is sponsored by the Canadian Association of Broadcasters, a national group of private radio and television station managers and directors.

The association awards the \$1,000 first prize for the best presentation. Awards will be presented Saturday night by adjudicator Guy Beaulieu of Quebec City.

Accused Elects Trial No Pleas Are Entered

A Summerside man, Joseph Wilbert Hippenstall, elected trial by judge and jury when he appeared in Prince County court yesterday morning before Magistrate W. Chester S. 25 INDIAN TROOPS KILLED

Rogationtide Service Is Unusual On Island

SUMMERSIDE — Members of St. John's Church, St. Eleanor's, held their morning worship service Sunday in an unusual place—Roy Hately's farmyard next door to the church.

The service itself was unusual, for in the centre of it were horses and chickens, farm machinery and implements and buckets of potato and hay seed.

The service was one especially designed for Rogation Sunday, traditionally a time when God's blessing is asked on farms and spring sowing.

The service got underway at 11 a.m. when clergy and choir made their way from the church to the farmyard, repeating the prayer book litany.

The congregation, assembled at the farm, sang hymns to a taped organ accompaniment. Theme of the sermon was "God's presence and activity in the world."

Farmers of the parish presented buckets of seed, farm implements and machinery and livestock to be blessed by the rector, Rev. Robert Tuck.

Following benediction of the homestead and farmyard, prayers were said at a nearby ploughed field for all farms and farmers, and the ancient canticle, Benedictus, was recited.

The ceremony was the first Rogationtide service to be held at St. Eleanor's. The custom is widespread in Nova Scotia and elsewhere. The form of service is adapted from one which originated in the Episcopal Church of the United States.

Helress' Death Called Suicide

GROSSE POINTE FARMS, Mich. (AP) — Mrs. Ethel Dupont Warren, 49, heiress to one of the world's largest fortunes and ex-wife of Franklin D. Roosevelt Jr., was found dead in her home Tuesday.

Police said her death was an apparent suicide.

Police said she was found hanging from a belt attached to a bathroom shower fixture.

Mrs. Warren was the oldest child of Eugene du Pont, formerly a director of E.I. du Pont de Nemours and Co., and the niece of Lamont, Pierre and Irene du Pont.

She and Roosevelt had two sons, Franklin III, 27, and Christopher, 24.

Disaster Services Explained

ALBERTON — Iphigenie Arsenault, Red Cross commissioner for Prince Edward Island, and Frank MacDonald, chairman of disaster services, met with a good representation of the Tignish, Alberton and Leary branches of the disaster services at Alberton last evening.

In addressing the branch members Mr. MacDonald stressed the importance of being well organized and always prepared for any disaster which might occur.

He also noted that Red Cross assistance to disaster victims is based on need, not loss, and that such assistance is always of an emergency nature, extending over a period of two or three days.

If assistance is needed over a longer period those requiring it should be referred to other agencies.

Mr. MacDonald outlined briefly the duties of local committees after which Miss Arsenault conferred with members of each concerning organization and other matters.
