The Charlottetown Little Theatre Guild made a difficult play look easy last night with a brilliant presentation of the Victorian thriller "Angel Street" at the Queen Charlotte High School.

The adjudicators Mrs. E. W. Patterson and Mr. Stuart Dickson voiced high praise for the manner in which the cast carried out their parts.

Mrs. Patterson suggested that the play should be entered in the Drama Festival next year and her suggestion was greeted by a loud round of applause from the large crowd.
