Liberals Nominate Clark, Campbell In Third

CARDIGAN — A Liberal nominating convention at Cardigan last night named Hon. Keir Clark minister of education, Montague and Joseph G. Campbell, Poplar Point as its standard bearers for third District Kings.

Mr. Campbell will stand for Assemblyman while Clark will run for Councillor.

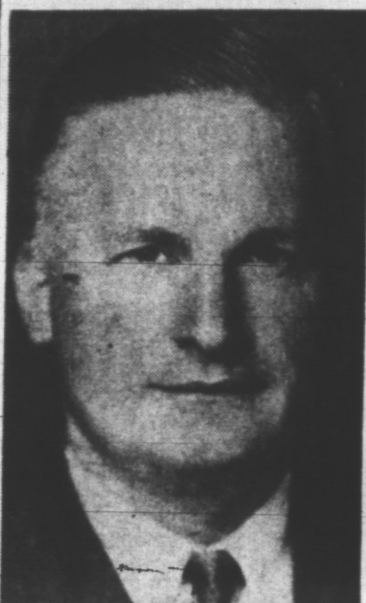
The speakers were the two candidates, Hon. Keir Clark and Joseph Campbell. George Saville and Premier Alex Matheson also spoke briefly.

The hall was filled to its capacity of 350 people.

Hugh MacEachern president of Third District of Kings Liberal Association presided over the convention. Dick MacLean, Montague was the secretary.

This was the final nominating convention for the Liberals who along with their Conservative opponents have a full slate of 30 candidates in the field for the provincial election.

Today is nomination day for all candidates with papers to be filed between the hours of 10 a. m. and 4 p. m. The CCF party

are not running any candidates in this election.

P.C. Candidate Flails Matheson Government

Speaking in York Hall last night, Andrew MacRae, Conservative candidate in the third district of Queens stated that the Matheson government, contrary to the election propaganda running currently in the local press, did not keep all the promises made prior to the election of 1955.

Other speakers included Russell Driscoll, Mr. MacRae's running mate, Heath MacQuarrie, M.P., Senator J. J. MacDonald, and Edwin MacRae, president of the Queens County YPC organization.

Chaired by Leith Brown, York, the PC get together was interspersed with entertainment provided by George MacDonald, the Roberts Sisters and Edith McCann.

BROKEN PLEDGES
Mr. MacRae opened his remarks by listing some of the promises NOT kept by the Matheson Government: (1) An over-all license system which would provide lower licenses on small trucks and adjust large truck licenses to make licence fees payable quarterly; (2) a new chicken processing plant at Charlottetown that would call for 3,000 chickens, as well as other products.

"They did not only fail to keep this promise but by their activities elsewhere killed a fine poultry organization handling poultry in Charlottetown," he said.

He said the Premier also stated that there were three or four food processors anxious to locate here, some without any cost to the province, and one that would employ upwards of 1,000 people.

One of the largest in Canada would be in operation by the fall of 1955, he said. Our province the Premier stated was a magnet for large U.S. and Canadian firms seeking to establish here.

"Where are they?" demanded Mr. MacRae.

WISHES DEFIED
The late government also promised that Hospital insurance would be purely voluntary and then against the wish and vote of the Legislature made it an ultra-compulsory project, Mr. MacRae noted.

Mr. MacRae added that there were many, many more unkept promises and said that a provincial Conservative administration would establish fish bait centres where they were most needed.

Russell Driscoll said he lost much Newfoundland trade through lack of initiative, adding that since we are a garden province we could most certainly have a ready market for our potatoes and other vegetables.

"We were also told that wonderful opportunities existed in Northern Quebec and Labrador. But instead a delegation from the Matheson government flew up to these veritable gold mines—they come back and tell us that the trade has been all picked up by other concerns," he stated.

"Is this the kind of government we want to represent?" demanded Mr. Driscoll, "after all we are an agriculture province and markets for our produce are of paramount importance."

MERE JUSTICE
Heath MacQuarrie said that the fact that we received from the Diefenbaker Government more money since the time of Confederation was lust mere justice and not a gift.

The number from Queen's also mentioned the airport extension which was talked about for 7 years and now is becoming a reality. Electors must consider the Road of Resources, project amounting to \$7,500,000, he said.

Speaking on matters closer to home the former university professor expressed delight concerning the teachers supplement legislation to be enacted after Sept. 1 when Walter Shaw formed his government.

He also mentioned the fact that there was a parallel between the pipeline and our provincial hospital plan.

Mr. MacQuarrie stated that Lester Pearson had admitted that the federal Liberals lost power because the brass had forgotten about the grass.

ALBERTON — More entries of livestock than in any previous year and a number of new exhibitors give promise that the 33rd Prince County Exhibition to be held at Alberton on Wednesday and Thursday will continue the trend of expansion which has been evident at this event each year.

Barns have been improved to show livestock to better advantage and the show ring has been enlarged.

Within the main building additional space for the showing of ladies' work has been provided and there is indication that it will be put to good use. A number of entries for these classes have already been received and many more will come in before judging begins later today.

Several new classes have been added to the prize list. They are for feeder steers, for ponies and for bantams. New sections in the horse class are for progeny of dam and get of sire.

Special prizes are offered by R. T. Holman Ltd. for both livestock and domestic science; by

D. L. Miller for livestock; by Frank Hardy of Rosebank for foals; by Don Campbell for calves; by Ralph Adams of O'Leary for feeder cattle; by Robert Campbell of Elmsdale for hogs; by Don and Victor Campbell of Alberton for baron hogs; by Cyril and Roy Learn for fruit and by the G. E. Barbour Co. for domestic science.

The official opening of the exhibition will be at 2 p.m. on Wednesday. This year's program will introduce several new features, including a variety program by West Prince talent Wednesday evening and a tractor rodeo scheduled for Thursday afternoon will give opportunity for drivers in this area to test their skill in handling tractors and four-wheel trailers.

WOMEN'S ORGANIZATIONS HELP

Victims Of Flood In India Aided By Island Red Cross

With the shipment of 12 cases containing 4,000 garments for children under eight years of age, Prince Edward Islanders are sharing in providing disaster relief for victims of the recent severe floods in India and Pakistan through the Prince Edward Island Division of the Canadian Red Cross Society. It is estimated that the flood disaster in Pakistan has made homeless one in every eight persons of the nearly 40 million population, with a damage of approximately \$50,000,000 and the picture in India is similar. There is a shortage of clothing and a vital need of drugs to combat possible epidemic in flooded areas.

Hundreds of women throughout the province who represent Women's Institutes, and many other organizations have contributed their time and energy in making up the hundreds of baby layettes, dresses, panties, overalls, jumper dresses and blouses, as well as sweaters, during the past winter with materials supplied through Red Cross.

The finished garments are then sized, done up in bundles of five, and packed in strong wooden boxes ready for overseas shipment.

Instructions were received yesterday by the P.E.I. Red Cross from the national headquarters in Toronto that the 12 cases should be shipped immediately by freight to Montreal where they will be carried to India, for distribution through the Indian Red Cross, by the S. S. "City of Singapore" which sails from Montreal between August 24th and 27th.

Information just sent to the Prince Edward Island Red Cross from D. Bruce Shaw, chairman of the national executive, said that an amount of \$30,000 had been cabled from Toronto to each of the Canadian high commissioners in New Delhi and Karachi.

\$40,000 ALLOCATED
This amount of \$40,000 was allocated by the national executive committee of the Canadian Red Cross during a recent meeting.

At that time representatives from all parts of Canada urged assistance for India and Pakistan when the seriousness of the situation could be ascertained. The need for assistance was confirmed by the League of Red Cross Societies, following tours of the devastated area by its representatives and officials of the high commissioners' offices in New Delhi and Karachi.

The money will be turned over to the Indian and Pakistan Red Cross Societies by the Canadian high commissioners in the respective nations. An accounting of the expenditure for relief purposes will be supplied to the Canadian officials by the Red Cross societies involved.

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New Glasgow, North Rustico Appealing For Blood Donors

The Junior Farmers of New Glasgow, headed by Elbert Orr, as chairman, and the North Rustico Branch of the Canadian Legion with Bert Blaquiere as chairman, are again spearheading the drive for blood donors in their respective areas. This week, both committees are conducting an active campaign to

insure the success of next Monday's Red Cross blood donor clinics which will be the first of next week's four days' series.

New Glasgow's clinic is to be held in the afternoon between 2 and 4 o'clock at the Junior Farmers' Hall with an objective of 100 donors. As the result of the first clinic held in New Glasgow at this same time last year, 84 donors responded to the appeal for 100. While this was an excellent result, Elbert Orr and his energetic committee, are determined that they will exceed their goal this year.

At the conclusion of the afternoon clinic at New Glasgow, the mobile Red Cross blood donor team from Halifax will go to North Rustico to hold the evening clinic in Stella Maris Hall between 7 and 9 p.m. when the quota is 175 donors. Last year the attendance at North Rustico was just 131 donors, (the best results ever obtained in North Rustico) but the combined results of the New Glasgow — North Rustico clinics totalled 215 which was considerably in excess of the best response obtained when the clinic was held only at North Rustico.

With these two clinics being held so close together, residents in this area will have the opportunity of attending either the afternoon or evening session, whichever is more convenient. However, as there is keen competition between the committees at New Glasgow and North Rustico, each is most anxious to reach or exceed its objective.

It is understood that members of both the New Glasgow and North Rustico committees are contacting the summer visitors in their areas to endeavour to interest them in attending their clinics as donors.
