Peach Brown Betty
1/2 cup butter, melted
2 cups soft bread crumbs
6 cups sliced, pared peaches
1/2 cup granulated or brown sugar
1/2 tsp. nutmeg or mace
1/2 tsp. cinnamon
1 tablesp. grated lemon rind
2 tablesp. lemon juice.
1/4 cup water.
Toss butter with crumbs. Arrange 1/2 cups on greased 1 1/2 qt. casserole. Cover with 1/2 peaches and 1/2 combined sugar, nutmeg, cinnamon and rind. Cover with 1/2 crumbs, rest of peaches, rest of sugar mixture. Spoon on combined lemon juice and water. Top with rest of crumbs. Cover.
Bake in moderately hot oven of 375 deg. F. for 1/2 hour. Uncover. Bake 1/2 hour or until peaches are done.
Serve with cream or your favorite pudding sauce.
