- SHARP EARTHQUAKE**—SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—A Sharp Earthquake hit San Francisco at 8:11 p.m. PST Sunday night. It continued for at least a minute.
- LOST 48 HOURS**—SYDNEY (CP)—Three Sydney men, Frank Sheppard, Ernie Newell, and John Dwyer were found early Sunday in woods near Grand Mira, about 20 miles from here, after being lost for 48 hours. An RCMP police dog found the men in a clearing huddled around a fire. They suffered no ill effects.
- PARIS (AP)**—Foreign Secretary Harold Macmillan of Britain said Sunday that if progress is made at Geneva this week toward easing international tensions there may be another meeting of the Big Four foreign ministers in the spring.
