**Welshmen In B.C. Pushing Own Form Of Biculturalism**

VANCOUVER (CP) — Welshmen on Canada's west coast have come out in favor of biculturalism, which they say they have been practising for years. They don't insist that the liquid tones of Wales take their place alongside English as a national language, but they do think they have a case for other considerations. They have protested to Prime Minister Pearson the omission of the Welsh daffodil from the Canadian silver dollar and they seek equality in the consideration of any new Canadian flag. Victor Williams, president of the Victoria Cambrian Society, has suggested that the coin be reissued—incorporating a daffodil emblem. The society, with members forming the most vocal group more than a Scot or an Irishman.

He says Welsh immigrants are among the most valuable in Canada because they integrate invisibly, yet retain their own culture and language. "Our country's strength is to absorb the contributions of many cultures," says Don Prichard, secondary school inspector for the Vancouver school board. "And the Welsh contribution is significant."

They are demanding equality with the French four-decils, the English rose, Scottish thistle and Irish shamrock. "The thistle, the rose and the shamrock are included on Canadian coinage as tributes to the British founders of Canada," says Professor Geoffrey Davies, executive assistant to the president of the University of British Columbia, who emigrated here from Wales after the Second World War. "Four roses, not three, make up the peoples of Britain," he says. "And while the Welshman is proud to be British, he will never admit to being English any more than a Scot or an Irishman."

**Canadian Business Takes Budget Speech In Stride**

The word most frequently applied to Finance Minister Gordon's newest budget was standpoint. It could have been used equally well to describe businessmen's reaction. They took the document in stride, scarcely breaking step to study it, praising it where expected and damping it as anticipated. Most of the reaction even had a propped-up air, as though the business community is more interested in trying to make the budget's prediction of a 2½-per-cent rise in the gross national product come true. The praise came from dropping the proposed 20-per-cent withholding tax on dividends paid to foreign owners of Canadian companies with less than 25 per cent Canadian participation. The proposal had been attacked by many business leaders as one that would do great harm to Canada's image abroad and frighten off necessary foreign capital. The plan sparked speculation about expansion plans of the other major car makers. Burns, which operates seven parking houses across Canada, had earnings of 79 cents a share in 1962 and estimated earnings of 68 cents last year.

GM said it will announce details of a new car assembly plant in about three months. Montreal was most frequently mentioned as the likely site. There also was a general, but not unanimous, attack on Mr. Gordon's refusal to cut income taxes — although no one had really expected him to do so. More excitement was generated by General Motors of Canada's announcement of its expansion plans for the next two years. GM President E. H. Walker described the plan as a \$120,000,000 vote of confidence in Canada's economy and business was quick to take it on its word. The happiest noise came from Ottawa, Windsor, and St. Catharines, designated as the points that will receive the new plants or extensions of existing ones. When the program, part of General Motors Corporation's \$2,000,000,000 world-wide plan, is completed, more than 4,000 new jobs will be available. The plan sparked speculation about expansion plans of the other major car makers. Burns, which operates seven parking houses across Canada, had earnings of 79 cents a share in 1962 and estimated earnings of 68 cents last year.

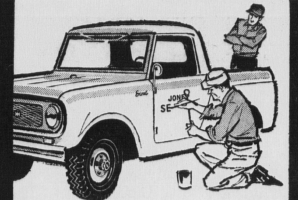
