Blaze In Head Office Of Firm Begins Widespread Probe

TEL AVIV (Reuters) — A blaze in the head office of the Canadian-owned Supercol Corp. last month started a full-scale police investigation which has covered suspected arson as well as detailed investigations of alleged forgeries, mismanagement and fraud.

Police sources said the exact figures involved in the alleged fraud have not yet been established. But a police statement in court says at least 4,000,000 Israeli pounds (about \$1,300,000) of the company's funds were siphoned off during the last few years.

The affairs of Supercol, which runs a chain of supermarkets in Israel, had been scrutinized for some time before the fire following suspicion that the books of the company were tampered with.

But matters began to move swiftly after July 18 when documents of the company were destroyed in the flames. Explained by police officers elected for the Supercol of Israel, Abraham Feinberg, 33, a Detroit native, was detained by police on July 30 he was remained in custody pending inquiries into allegations that he, arson, forgery, destruction of evidence and obtaining money by false pretenses.

Police Superintendent Benjamin Zigel told the renegade magistrate the police had grounds to believe Feinberg made false entries of the value of the company's stock to inflate their volume and thus cover up the fact the company was losing money.

The police officer also alleged that Feinberg used company funds to pay the interest on personal loans of hundreds of thousands of pounds. He said Feinberg had deliberately set fire to company documents to destroy the evidence against him.
