## SIXTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT

### Of St. Vincent De Paul Sewing

The first meeting was held on the 11th of January, 1900. The officers chosen were Mrs. Reddin, President, Rev. Dr. Morrison, Treasurer, and Katie Gaven, Secretary. Twenty-four active members were enrolled and three honorary. The weekly meetings had an average attendance of fourteen.

The Society acknowledges with gratitude the receipt of a box of clothing from Mrs. G. McDonald, of Little Pond; a box of blankets and clothing from Mrs. Beaton and Miss Catherine McDonald; a case of suits for little boys from Mrs. James Eden; a parcel of clothing from Mrs. D. Reddin, jr., and Miss Young's husband; a donation of stockings from a friend; boots to the value of four dollars and clothing from Mr. Alfred McEachern. The Society has also to thank several of our city merchants for their generous gifts in material and clothing.

The following is a list of the articles of clothing and furnished by the Society:— 74 pairs of boots, 25 coats, 18 pairs of pants, 95 articles of underclothing, 45 pairs of socks and stockings, 16 large dresses, 20 small dresses, 14 undershirts, 12 pairs of mitts, 24 shirts, 3 blankets, 2 quilts, 25 sundries.
