



Spahn's Winner Of Young Award

NEW YORK (AP)—Warren Spahn, ace of the world champion Milwaukee Braves and biggest winner in the major leagues last season, was voted the Cy Young Memorial Award Thursday as the leading pitcher in baseball.

The brilliant southpaw, whose 21 victories were a prime factor in Milwaukee's first National League pennant, received all but one of the votes of the 16-man panel of baseball writers who participated in the annual poll. The other vote went to Dick Donovan, Chicago White Sox pitcher.

Spahn, 38 next April, thus becomes the second National

Canadian Press Staff Writer TORONTO (CP)—Coach Bud Grant brought his Winnipeg Blue Bombers into Toronto Thursday and insisted he has no bag of tricks to spill in Saturday's Grey Cup game.

"We have been working out with our regular game," Grant said in the meeting with Hamilton Tiger-Cats. Grant indicated a strong running game would be his main attack.

"We haven't much concern about speculation and talk — both about sweeping over Toronto in a week—that the Bombers had passed the peak of their season and would be 'up' as they were 'defeating Edmonton Eskimos for the Western title."

"What effect it can you get your team against the Cats, how like they were against the Eskimos?" he was asked.

"It isn't so much having the other club, as having the Grey Cup."

Grant said there would be another limbering-up and drill to follow. By then he hoped to have a better idea whether all his injured would be ready for Saturday's big game.

Mendy was wearing a cast on his broken wrist, but Grant said his back should be able to play. "He has trouble reaching a pass but he can take a hand in," said the coach.

There were 32 players in the Bomber party. Only 28 will be dressed for the game, the maximum under Canadian Rugby Union regulations.

The Bombers arrived with help from Toronto.
