Will Urge Continuance Of Present Summerside Borden Highway Route

The proposed route of the highway from Summerside to Borden was the main topic of discussion at the regular monthly meeting of the Summerside Board of Trade held last night in the Town Hall.

In view of the fact that there would follow the Searletown short cut through Froot de Bedeque rink a petition had been presented by the residents of Bedeque to the Provincial Government some time ago requesting that the old established route be maintained, as this was the route that would serve the most people and render the most good.

Mr. T. J. Imman, of the agriculture committee, pointed out that this highway now existing serves a district second to none as an agricultural locality. The Summerside Board unanimously agreed not only to support this petition, but to press between Borden and Summerside be maintained as is and that work be started immediately to put the entire road in good condition. A resolution to be prepared by the transportation committee is to be presented immediately to the Premier of the Province requesting that this be done.

Mr. Lorne H. MacFarlane and Mr. E. P. Foley, representatives of the Fifth District of Prince, who were present, stated that they would do all possible to support this move.

Night Watchman Service

Mr. Ross MacKenzie, chairman of the Retail Merchants Committee, advised the Board that the present night watchman service which the Summerside merchants have maintained for some time now would be terminated on this Friday night due to the fact that the man engaged had found other and more suitable employment. It would be up to the local merchants he said if they wanted to make arrangements to engage another man to take his place and to carry on this service.

Mr. MacKenzie explained for the benefit of the members present the functions of the retail merchant committee, to bring in recommendations to the board to be passed along to the Town Council for action on such matters for instance as store closing hours, special holidays and so forth and thus relieve the onus from the larger stores of deciding for all which days should be observed and also when local stores should close. He pointed out that this retail merchant committee is not a closed corporation, that any trade or profession may have representation on it and be allowed to voice their opinions on matters such as these. care, transportation and theatre admissions—edged to 138.8 from 137.8. Because rents were not surveyed in April, the rent index stayed at 137.6. The index for May will show any rent increases effective since February.

Wholesale Index

In the wholesale price index, issued with the cost-of-living index, the Bureau noted that at April 27 the indexes of both industrial materials and farm products had slipped downward from the figures for March 30. The industrial materials figure went to 304.5 from 305.5, while the Canadian farm products index slipped to 254.4 from 252.6. Both are based on 100 for the 1935-39 period.

In telling the Commons about his April 9 prediction on the living-cost rise, Mr. Howe said it had been based on an estimate he had asked the Bureau of Statistics to make. At the time, he said, that preliminary survey indicated the index would hold about even in March or rise not more than one-half of one per cent, which is
