**Cardigan Has Crowds Before Festivities Start**

CARDIGAN — The Cardigan centennial committee under the

chairmanship of Noel Wilson apparently has struck the jackpot with its barbecue steer as a drawing card.

Yesterday, one day before the event, upwards of 1,000 or more people viewed the cooking of this 403 pound steer. The animal was placed on the spit Friday morning at 2:05 and will remain over the charcoal pit for 24 to 28 hours.

This barbecuing of a whole steer is believed to be the first in the province.

Other attractions for today, which has been declared a half-holiday by the village commissioners, will be the soap box derby at nine a.m. with a bicycle race at 9:30. For the athletes a full track and field program is to take place for the juniors at 10:30 and for the seniors at 12:00.

At 2:15 p.m. a mammoth parade will take place starting at the CNR station. A band concert by the Royal Dragoons will be presented at the ball field opposite All Saints Church at 3:30, with the steer barbecue dinner with all the trimmings commencing at five p.m. The dinner will continue until nine.

Dancing of all kinds will take place beginning at seven and running until after 12 midnight. The sky divers will do six jumps into the field by the ball field commencing after six p.m.

Mr. Wilson, who someone said was the busiest man in Kings County yesterday, stated that they expected to get about 1,000 diners from the steer. Rubin Cross, catering manager at Montgomery Hall examined the steer, which is being cooked under his direction, and said, it was doing fine and would be a very tender and tasty dinner. **Crackdown Continues On Shipping Violations**

A North Rustico fisherman's appearance in Magistrate's Court yesterday was part of the RCMP's crackdown on violations of the Shipping Act regulations, according to a spokesman.

The attorney general's office and the RCMP wish to make clear the fact that the regulations apply to all vessels, and not just to boats hired out to tourists, as many fishermen, especially in the North Rustico area, seem to think.

As a result of the prosecution, Magistrate James B. Johnston, QC, fined Bernard Dolron \$30 and costs or 15 days for failing to provide at least one life jacket for each passenger in his boat. The magistrate warned last week that further violations of the act would result in stiffer penalties.

A Charlottetown man, Garnet James Livingston, was fined \$100 and costs or 10 days when he pleaded guilty to impaired driving.

Calvin Matheson, Cornwall, was fined \$15 and costs or five days on each of two offences under the Unemployment Insurance Act. The charges alleged that he had issued falsified statements.

Kendall Donald MacKenzie of New Wilshire had his petty theft case adjourned to August 14 for sentence.

Windsor Harvey Adams of Southport was fined \$10 and costs or five days for failing to report with his car for inspection to the RCMP when ordered to do so.

The driving without due care and consideration case against Lawrence David Bing-

ley was adjourned by consent to August 21 to fix a date for trial.

William Gregg of French Fork pleaded not guilty to impaired driving and was remanded by consent to September 4 for trial.

Preliminary hearing of the jail escape case against Donald William Brehaut of Charlottetown continued. John Nicholson, representing the defence, gave notice that the defence will produce evidence, and then Brehaut was remanded by consent to September 4 to fix a date for re-commencement of the hearing, at which time the defence evidence will be heard.

Two men were each fined \$30 and costs or 30 days for illegal possession of liquor.
