The Queen Charlotte High Contributes To Community

A variety of items in the Home Economics line along with some musical numbers were featured in a program held Thursday evening in the Queen Charlotte High School Auditorium.

A short address of welcome to the assembled parents and friends was given by Virginia MacNutt of Grade 9. This was followed by a square dance done by Grade 7, in which the girls wore the gathered skirts made in their sewing classes. More of these skirts, in a variety of prints and plain colors, were shown as the girls in the five Grade Seven classes came forward on the stage.

In lighter vein, girls from the four Grade Eight classes presented a skit entitled "The Case of the Delinquent Home Ec'ers." This was designed, in rather exaggerated fashion, to point out how a girl should be groomed and equipped for work in the Home Economics kitchen.

An interesting version of the old song "School Days" was then given by Grade Seven girls. This was followed by a Grade Eight "blouse parade," which featured for the most part various blouse Grade Eight girls who had made. These were modelled by the Grade Eight girls who had made the blouses in their sewing classes. A wide range of colors was shown in plain and striped cotton materials.

Summaries of the year's work were given by the following pupils: Glenda Kitson, for Grade Seven; Gail Robertson for Grade

Eight; and Sharon Wright for Grade Nine.

These summaries led up to a panel discussion entitled "After Three Years, What?" The first point brought out was that there are Home Economics courses given in some schools after these three years in Grades Seven, Eight, and Nine.

There is a course of studies for Home Economics in P. E. I. schools, which outlines the work from Grade Seven through to Grade Twelve. The panelists expressed the thought that they would continue Home Economics in Grade Ten if the course was made available.

They also felt that this subject is not "a frill" but a very necessary part of a girl's education whether she goes on for advanced Home Economics studies or uses the basic knowledge obtained in Grades Seven, Eight, and Nine to further her own welfare as a career girl or that of her family, if she marries.

Further discussion revealed that there is a scarcity of trained Home Economists today and many more available positions than people to fill them.

Reading from a pamphlet distributed in class, the girls summarized the different careers possible in this field; including teachers, dietitians, extension workers, (with Women's Institutes, etc.) research workers in foods and textiles, consultants with large firms, journalists for magazines, radio, and television; and among others, the all important

task of homemaking.

The final point emphasized in the discussion was that there is much more to Home Economics than stitching a straight seam or baking a good cake, helpful as these may be; the intangibles of human relationships also are covered by this subject in its fullest scope. It is in the latter area that Home Economics can assist in the development of improved habits and attitudes within the family, the community, and the nation. To quote: "The Home Economics profession is dedicated to the ultimate victory of human dignity over materialism."

Following this serious note in the program, an amusing musical number based on the song "Bilby Boy" was presented. Continuing in the entertainment line, a fashion show took place next. Within the setting of a prettily decorated stage and to a background of appropriate music supplied by Mr. Mugford, Grade Nine girls modelled some of the garments they had made. These included dresses, blouses, skirts, and sportswear.

An English round dance in which a large group of Grade Seven girls participated was the closing number on the program. Refreshments prepared in the Home Economics kitchen were served by the grade nine girls. Guests were invited to look over a display of Home Economics notebooks and a display of samples of woodworking made by the boys in the Manual Training Department.
