

### S'IDE OUTDOOR THEATRE EXPANDING

Strlite Theatre has announced plans for an expansion of their outdoor theatre, about two miles east of Summerside. On Saturday work was completed on the installation of six steel supports each weighing two tons, and measuring 60 feet in height, which will carry what is said to be the largest outdoor screen in the Maritimes, measuring 96 feet long by 44 feet high. The new screen will be twice the size of the present one and the accommodation for cars will be increased to 600 from the present 200. A new projection booth and larger canteen facilities are in the construction stage.

### Park Lifeguards To Demonstrate

P.E.I. National Park officials will try a new experiment Sunday night when a lifeguard demonstration will be staged at Stanhope Beach.

The demonstration, put on by the National Park lifeguards at the park reserve, George Meakin, will include a competition between Stanhope and Cavendish lifeguards units, a demonstration of swimming strokes and various rescue methods. The meet is scheduled for 7 p.m. and will last one and one-half to two hours.

Lifeguards will demonstrate surfboard rescue, boat rescue and torpedo buoy rescue. In addition, the guards will be available following the exhibition to answer questions from the public, who will have the opportunity to view life saving equipment on display.

Taking part in the meet will be Herb Murphy, Peter DesRoches, Lowell Gallant, Vincent Fisher, James MacLean, Leonard Campbell, Cavendish Lifeguards; Gerald Mitchell, Morgan Mitchell, Ronald Smith, James Benham, David Gerge and William Stanish, Stanhope lifeguards; and swimming instructors Dorothy Morris (Cavendish) and Sheila MacDonald (Stanhope). Donald Pickard is head of the patrol boat.

It is expected that the meet will be repeated the following Sunday at Cavendish.

### Aquatic Day Ironies On Display in Alberton

ALBERTON — Trophies and prizes to be awarded at Alberton's Aquatic Day on Wednesday are now on display in C.R. Lear's window on Main Street.

Being offered for the first time this year is the beautiful Eastern Baskies trophy which will be awarded to the winner of the three-mile swim which is the main event of the day.

The Hayes Paving Company trophy is being offered to the third swimmer. Last year's winner was Sheila MacDonald of Charlottetown.

### Accord Reached On Laos Problem

GENEVA (CP) — Laos, pin-pointed Southeast Asian kingdom, whose destiny threatened a global struggle, was baptized into the political faith of neutrality Monday in an air of East-West accord.

The 16-nation conference that opened 14 months ago when civil war flared in Laos finally affixed signatures to an agreement that stipulates independence and territorial integrity for the land-locked, mountainous kingdom of 1.5 million, 800 people bordering Red China.

The 25-minute meeting in what was once the council chamber of the old League of Nations was ceremonious, with almost no speech-making. Foreign ministers from around the world — including Communist Britain, the United States and the Soviet Union — assumed the aspect of proud if not entirely satisfied go-fathers.

Signing for Canada, member of the International Control Commission in Laos, were External Affairs Minister Green and Ambassador Chester Ronning, negotiator during most of the onerous negotiations here.

Sitting beside them was Ambassador Lloyd Maynard, Canadian commissioner in Laos for a total of two years. Prince Souvanna Phouma, Laotian premier who represented his country Monday, has said it is the large measure thanks to the efforts of Maynard that full-scale war was averted.

The Canadian later attended a private conference luncheon reception and Green commented that the atmosphere of the conference was "friendly."

A spokesman for the fishermen said here one group of about six men was attacked by a whale Tuesday. He said the whale plunged toward the boat, sheared away briefly into a shallow cove near shore and then made another dash at the men, rocking four nearby boats in his path. One fisherman slipped in his boat and suffered a bruised side and rib injuries. He described it as a "terrifying experience."
