

Smokejumpers In Sask. Doing Good Job In Forests

PRINCE ALBERT, Sask., (CP)—His age is about 25. He weighs perhaps 160 pounds and may stand six feet, three inches. He wears no uniform, but proudly displays an insignia on his jacket.

He is a smokejumper, one of 16 well-trained young men who stand guard over northern Saskatchewan's forests. At any moment he may be summoned to jump from an airplane to fight the red demon of fire.

Saskatchewan's smokejumpers were organized in 1947 under parachutist Dennis Kelly of Prince Albert. The original crew of eight has doubled in size.

In nine years of fighting forest fires, some accidents have occurred but they have been minor. More than 4,460 jumps have been made.

EFFICIENT FORCE

Jumpmaster Kelly, 30, says this year's crew consists of "a good bunch of brave boys who have performed their jobs better than ever before." By the end of July they had flown to 34 fires and had

parachuted to 10 with safety and efficiency.

Kelly, who learned to parachute in 1942 at Aldershot, England, where he was posted with the British Army, became an instructor in parachuting with the special Canadian parachute battalion. Then, until the war's end, he trained parachutists at Farnborough, England, Fort Benning, Ga. and Helena, Mont.

Each year since 1947 he has held a course in smokejumping. Recruits undergo rigid training, first at Prince Albert's airport and then in forested land in the North. By late spring they are ready for their job of forest fire fighting.

The men have classroom studies of forests, conservation, maps, outdoor life, first aid courses and numerous other lessons. Then come the first two trial jumps.

Two Indians are in this year's crew. Each year more men apply for smokejumper jobs than are needed.

SPEED ESSENTIAL

With summer headquarters in La

Ronge, smokejumpers are close to the wide expanse of heavy northern forests. They must be ready at a moment's notice to don parachutes and equipment, and board a waiting plane.

Each man is "dropped off" singly at the fire scene. Provisions, tools and equipment are dropped to him minutes later. These consist of power pumps, hose, hand tools such as an axe, shovel and canvas water pumps. A two-way radio is dropped to supply communication and rations of canned vegetables and meat also are dropped.

From then on smokejumpers battle with the flames. If water is near, they use their pumps and hose. If not, they dig trenches or use sand to stop the spread of fire.

When the job is done, they head for the nearest lake where a plane "land" to pick them up.

HEAVY EQUIPMENT

Each man must carry about 100 pounds of equipment after he is through fighting the fire and says Kelly, this often is a difficult problem in the forested areas.

Losses of equipment frequently occur. One of the major losses occurred during a fire north of Meadow lake when a camp of parachutists and supplies was destroyed by fire.

During slack times, when the forest-fire hazard is low, the men work on roads and bridges, repair equipment or make parachutes and canopies. They are never idle.

Fred Warburton, fire control supervisor, says: "There are a very important force to have quick action on fires before they become uncontrolled, to save valuable timber resources."

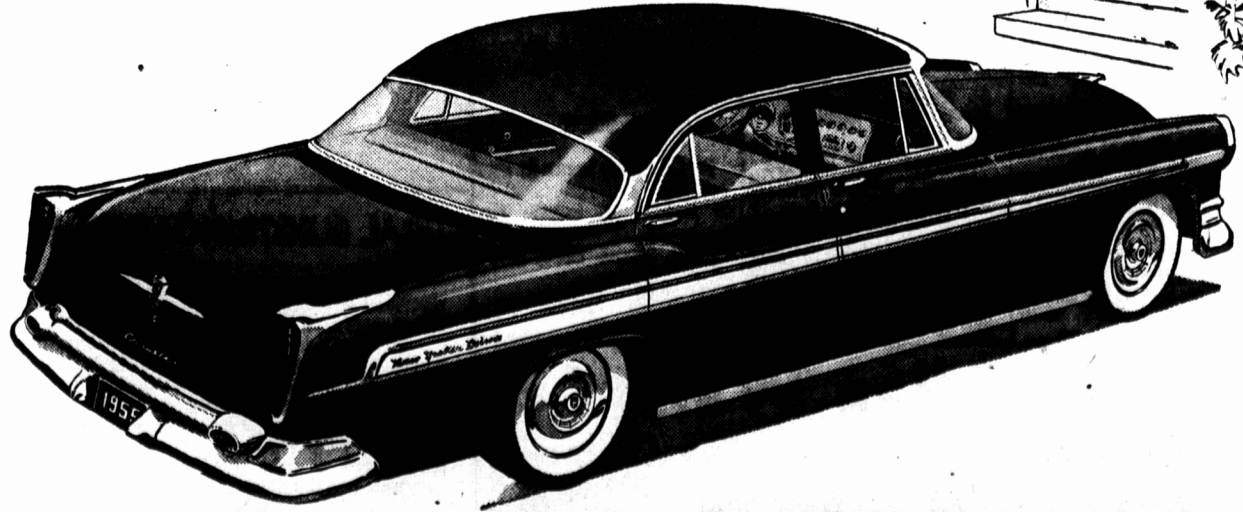
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
