Farmers' Meeting at Baddeck Bridge.

BADDECK, November 27.—T. G. Raynor, of Ontario, and C. H. Black, of Amherst, addressed a farmers meeting at Baddeck Bridge on Saturday evening. Messrs. Raynor and Black have this week addressed meetings at Mabou, Strathlorne, S. W. Margaree, Margaree Forks, N. E. Margaree and Middle River. These meetings are held under the auspices of the Maritime Breeders' Association. The subjects discussed included "the growing of farm crops, particularly roots and clover," and "the breeding, feeding, and development of live stock." Mr. Raynor is not only a pleasant speaker but is thoroughly acquainted with the subjects he discusses. Mr. Raynor has done good work in the farmers' institutes of Ontario and the west, and it is to be regretted that owing to the bad state of the weather and roads these meetings have not been more largely attended. However, the evident interest shown by those present is very encouraging and we hope for better meetings in the future.

Has anything been done yet towards the arrest and punishment of the ballot-box thief?

In a report issued by the British Board of Trade on the share and loan capital of railways, together with particulars of traffic in passengers and goods, working expenses, and net profits for the year 1899 of the railways in the United Kingdom, the capital paid up is given as over 1,150 million pounds, and the receipts from mineral &c., and live stock traffic at £52,117,000, and the amount carried at 413.6 million tons. The cost of fuel is returned at £4,278,000.

An extended report of the opening meeting of the Maritime Stock Breeders Association held in the Kindergarten Hall this forenoon is held over until tomorrow. President Elderkin delivered a good practical address, and Mr. C. A. Archibald, of Truro, read an interesting paper on the registration of stock. A discussion followed in which Hon. Mr. Dryden, Mr. C. C. Gardiner, Mr. Wise, Mr. Callbeck, Mr. Hodson and Mr. J. A. McDonald, of Hermantville, took part.

Mr. FLYNN, the leader of the Opposition in Quebec, in his address to the electors of that province declares that the Provincial Government has taken an unfair advantage of the people and is seeking a snap verdict, when it hurries on a general election in three weeks, without notice, and with the public accounts for the last eighteen months missing. It seems that the contest was ordered from Ottawa and it has been remarked that this is what the people get from the alliance of the Federal and Provincial Governments. It is a curious fact that Mr. Parent explains his appeal on the ground that a new Premier has been selected, and that the constitution requires the new man to be endorsed. There was a new Premier in P. E. Island not long since; but he did not take the same view of the constitution. There was no appeal to the people for endorsement, owing to the trifling circumstance that such an appeal would have resulted in defeat. Now, when the echoes of the Dominion contest are still in the air, he ventures to try a fall with the people.

—The Halifax came into port about half-past five this morning, bringing four passengers viz., Miss D. B. McLeod, Jas. Macdonald, Sarah Haal and Ernest Gardner. She "laid too" outside the harbor all night on account of the storm.

—This being the last trip this season of the steamer Halifax there were many of the friends of Captain Pye, Mate Ellis, Steward Noyes and the other popular officers on the wharf to see the good ship off and say au revoir. The officers of the Halifax have hosts of friends at this port by whom they will be warmly welcomed back next year.

—It is reported that the cigarette fiend is making headway in Toronto, in spite of the Provincial law which forbids the sale of cigarettes to persons under eighteen years of age. The superintendent of the Industrial School at Mimico said recently at a board meeting that 75 per cent. of the boys admitted were addicted to cigarettes and that their physical development was stunted by the practice.

R., who was so badly injured in the Grand Falls bridge accident, arrived on the Montreal train at noon to again take up his work.
