Teachers Ask Commission To Probe Salaries Problem

After roll call and reading of the minutes of the last session, Mr. J. Pineau conducted a class in French pronunciation at the second day's sessions of the teachers' convention yesterday at Montague. As this is a subject that is very difficult for most teachers, Mr. Pineau's excellent instruction and practice period was much appreciated. The question box committee took over from Mr. Pineau and many matters of special concern were discussed and dealt with.

The following resolutions were passed:
The thanks of the convention were extended to the Montague School Board for use of the auditorium, to guest speakers, to the press, and to Mr. T. R. Hall of MacMillan Co., of Canada.
2. Resolved that the P. E. I. Teachers Federation convene to press the Government to contribute dollar for dollar towards the teachers' superannuation fund.
3. Resolved that whereas the teachers of P. E. I. are the lowest paid in Canada and whereas this contributes to the scarcity of trained professional teachers, Be it resolved that this convention ask the Board of Governors of the Teacher's Federation to urge the appointment of a royal commission to investigate the question of teachers salaries in this Province.
4. Resolved that the Government be requested to open a school supply branch in Montague for the teachers and students of this area.

2,124 Arrested In Turkish Riots

LONDON (Reuters) — Ankara radio Friday said Turkish authorities have arrested 2,124 persons "suspected of acts of provocation" in connection with Tuesday's anti-Greek riots.

It said authorities are rounding up "all Communists, provocateurs and agitators" who took part in the riots in Istanbul and Izmir. Military tribunals were set up in Istanbul, Ankara and Izmir to try "Communists and provocateurs," it added.

W. M. S. Rally

On August 25th, 1955 a W.M.S. Rally was held in St. Peter's United Church opening at 2:30 p.m. In spite of the very unfavorable weather, a goodly number of women braved the elements to be present and take part in the proceedings of the rally.
