Dulles Charges Reds Violate Korean Truce

WASHINGTON, (AP) — State Secretary Dulles has charged the Communists have clearly violated some terms of the Korean armistice, but says the violations do not justify resuming the war. Dulles said Tuesday the Reds have deliberately obstructed the work of the neutral nations supervisory commission and probably have built up their airpower beyond the limits allowed under the 1953 cease-fire.

BERLIN (AP)—The East German Communist regime announced Tuesday night widespread arrests of alleged agents for the United States and West Germany operating in the Soviet zone.
SAINT JOHN, N.B. (CP)—Building officials in the Saint John-Lancaster-Simonds area have reported that construction projects valued at \$10,000,000 now are under way or are slated to begin shortly in the district.

Crown Claims Circumstantial Evidence Should Convict Coffin In Murder Case

PERCE, Que., (CP)—The crown Tuesday called for the conviction of Wilbert Coffin, on trial for the murder last summer of one of three American bear hunters, and said circumstantial evidence is sufficient to establish his guilt. Chief crown prosecutor Noel Dorion told the jury most crimes are committed in secret and quoted legal precedents that in such cases the court must consider how the suspect got the weapon, whether he tried to conceal it and if he fled the scene of the crime.
