Fashion is making such a big play for young customers this Spring. Even elementary school age fashions are showing the influence of Italian imports, of sophisticated color trends, of scooped neckline in contrast to the old-fashioned rounded ones.

#### Pretty Lingerie

Lingerie, too, is definitely an important part of young wardrobes, and that doesn't simply mean having enough slips, petticoats and panties. It means having the newly-styled and elaborate numbers that are truly irresistible.

Most outstanding in young fashions—both literally and figuratively—are the wide-skirted sheer nylon dresses, frothy petticoats and camisole slips that under them. An example of the elegance involved is a long-torso slip of nylon tulle and nylon tulle, flounced at the hem with simply miles of lavender tulle!

#### Sashes and Belts

Dresses are created of such diaphanous stuff as lavender or green net over white nylon sheer, sheer red nylon with a sheath of red and white striped tulle. Purple velvet sashes and satin belts add the final dash.

Of course, there are plenty less spectacular fashions available; camisoles and petticoats of white cotton, with pretty ribbon beading in vertical rows up the skirt and about the bodice. And in addition to the colorful dress sheers and brilliant Italian striped fabrics, there are such dependables as plaids and checks, large and small.

#### Print Patterns

There's much flocking, too, used in combination with print patterns, to increase the interest in fabric texture. On their return Mr. and Mrs. Daley have taken up residence in Charlottetown.

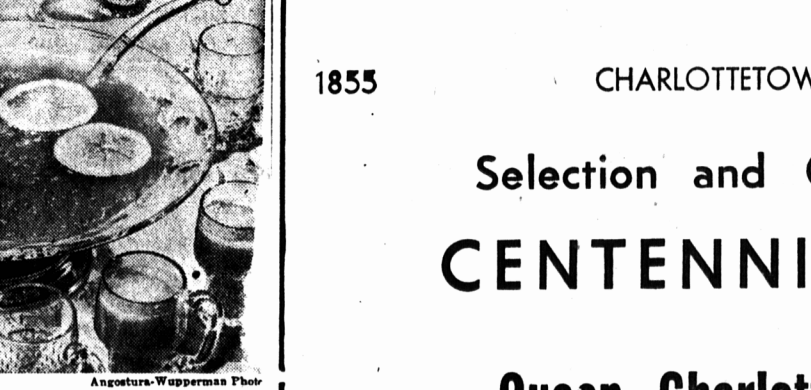
### LET'S EAT

#### Three Kinds Of Punch To Toast June Brides

A refreshing punch or an ice cream frosted beverage is a "must" at a wedding reception. There should be plenty, started in a punch bowl, with a ladle and matching cups for the service. Whether of silver or inexpensive glass, it will gleam against a white, natural or pastel cloth background.

It is not the spending of large amounts of money for food, but

rather good taste in planning and in choosing accessories that can make party service glamorous.

#### Party Service

Whatever the punch, it should be made in concentrated form to allow for dilution by the ice in the punch bowl. Otherwise, part of the punch itself, or one of the ingredients, can be frozen in ice cube form and used for chilling instead of ice. For example, use pineapple juice cubes for a fruit punch or frozen coffee cubes for coffee ice cream frost.

Here are recipes for three fine punches:

**Fruit Juice Punch:** Combine and mix the contents 2 (1 lb.) cans pineapple juice, 4 cans frozen lemonade concentrate, 4 cans frozen orange concentrate, 4 cups cold water and sugar to taste. Garnish with sliced strawberries, quartered thin orange slices, and the contents 1 (10 oz.) can frozen

**Wedding Punch Aromatic:** Combine and mix 2 c. cold strong tea, chilled pineapple juice, 2 cans frozen orange concentrate, 4 tbs. aromatic biters and 1 qt. bottled sparkling water. Pour into the punch bowl. Garnish with thin whole orange slices. Add ice cubes if desired. Serves 24.

#### CARAWAY CABBAGE FROM THE CHEF

Saute 1 tsp. caraway seed in 3 tbs. butter, add 1 tsp. vinegar and stir into 4 c. cooked shredded cabbage.

### HOUSEHOLD HINT

Whatever type or color your floors may be, a good general rule for washing them is to use a wrung-out sudsy cloth or mop, then wipe speedily with an almost dry mop. Never apply wax to a floor until it is completely dry. For an asphalt tile floor, mop with warm soapsuds and rinse. For concrete, scour with a stiff brush and hot soapsuds; rinse, flush with a hose if the floor has a drain.
