## LATEST NEWS BY WIRE AND MAIL.

NEW YORK, July 23.—The Evening Post prints the following special from London: Arrangements have been made to ship direct to the United States a considerable amount of gold from Australia. This is not generally known, and coming at a moment when gold movements from New York to London are looked for will create much interest.

LISBON, July 23.—A letter received here from Quilimane, Mozambique, East Africa, confirms the announcement made in the chamber of deputies today that the crew of a Portuguese gunboat had been massacred near Chinde, on the Zambesi river. According to this letter the gunboat was seized by Chief Cambumba and his followers, who killed all of the crew and nearly all of the native soldiers who were on board and captured the cannon.

LONDON, July 23.—The Times publishes a long letter from Harry Dewindt, the newspaper correspondent who some time since undertook to travel by land from New York to Paris. Describing the dangers and difficulties in the way of reaching the Yukon gold fields. He urges the Canadian government to construct a wagon road over White Pass, and warns Englishmen to wait until something of the kind is done, and not to be deceived by allurement of unscrupulous agents. He says there is no doubt that there is gold there, but that the wealth of the Indies will not compensate for the existing risks.

## A PRACTICAL TEST.

Dom Pedro, the last Emperor of Brazil, was a man of a practical turn of mind, as the following story told of him by a Spanish newspaper well illustrates.

He once gave an audience to a young engineer who came to sell him a new appliance for stopping a way engine. The Emperor was pleased with the idea, but wished to put it to a practical test.

"Day after to-morrow," he said, "have your engine ready. We will have it coupled to my saloon-carriage and start. When going at full speed I will give the signal to stop, and then we shall see how your invention works."

At the appointed time all was in readiness. The Emperor entered the carriage, the young inventor mounted his engine, and on they sped for several miles as fast as they could go. There came no signal, and the engineer began to fear that the Emperor had fallen asleep. Suddenly the engine came to a sharp curve around the edge of a cliff, when, to his horror, on the track directly ahead of them the engineer saw a huge boulder.

He had just sufficient presence of mind to turn the crank of his brake and pull the engine up within a couple of yards of the fatal block.

Here the Emperor put his head out of his car window and demanded to know the sudden stoppage. The engineer pointed to the rock, and, much to his surprise, Dom Pedro began to laugh.

"Push it to one side and go on," he said, calmly.

The engineer obeyed, and kicking the stone, was still further astonished to see it crumble into dust before him.

It was nothing more or less than a block of starch which the Emperor had made and placed on the rails the night before.—Harper's Round Table.

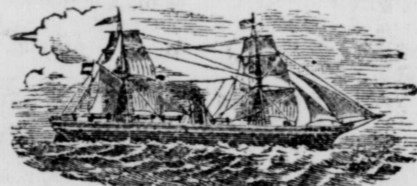
