

# Justice Aubin E. Arsenault Celebrates 96th Birthday

Justice Aubin E. Arsenault celebrates his 96th birthday at his home, 139 Upper Prince Street, today.

He was born at Egmont Bay on July 28, 1870. His father was Senator Joseph Octave Arsenault and his mother, Gertrude Gaudet. Justice Arsenault was educated at the village school in Egmont Bay, and at St. Dunstan's University and St. Joseph's University, Memramcook, N.B.

He was admitted to the Bar on November 1, 1896. He then spent one year of further study in the office of Sir Charles Russell, then one of the most famous lawyers of London. In 1899, during the Boer War, he was sent on an important mission to South Africa. On his return he began the practice of law in association with Neil MacQuarrie in Summerside.

He was first elected to the Provincial Legislature in 1906, and re-elected in 1912, 1915, 1919, and in a by-election in 1917. Judge Arsenault was Premier and Attorney-General from 1917 to 1919; then was leader of the opposition from 1919 to 1921. He was appointed Justice of the Supreme Court of Prince Edward Island in 1921, and retired in 1946 after serving 25 years in that position.

Justice Arsenault was married on November 5, 1907 to Bertha Rose Gallant, daughter of Captain Francis Gallant of Tignish, P.E.I. They have had a family of 12, 2 sons and 9 daughters. All are living except one daughter, Catherine, who died December 15, 192. Mrs. Arsenault died in 1912.

William Eugene Callaghan, O'Leary, was fined \$10 and costs for operating an improperly equipped vehicle while James Lorne Aylward, Skinnerville and William Joseph Arsenault, Pleasant View received similar fines for permitting improperly equipped vehicles to be operated on the highway.

cially for workers whose existing wages are far below the national average. He also may provide incentives for workers showing increased efficiency and high production.

The Congress decision resulted from increasing realization among union leaders that Britain is in deep economic trouble. Even with the stiff austerity measures already taken by Wilson, some economists predict another heavy attack on sterling in the fall.

The congress' decision came too late to boost the pound on the foreign exchange market. Nevertheless sterling had a relatively sunny day. It rose by one sixteenth of a cent to close at \$2.7912 in relation to U.S. funds, its highest level since May.

Wilson suggested in the Commons that part of the cause of previous attacks was the lack of balance in Britain's international accounts and a flood of reports a broad deprecating British industrial life. He hinted also that Britain's sterling troubles sprang from those who attacked the U.S. dollar.

Sterling, he said, is in the front line taking part of the attack directed against the dollar.

He named no countries although a British financial official said later the prime minister obviously was referring to France and those who sympathize with the French position.

France has been seeking a higher official price for gold, pegged at \$35 U.S. since 1934. It has concentrated huge dollar holdings into gold at the expense of the dwindling U.S. gold stockpile.

This forced the U.S. into a defensive position seeking measures to restrict the international flow of dollars.

Since dollars and sterling are the world's two major reserve currencies' financing world trade, American curbs tended to place a greater burden on sterling, the official said.

**ALBERTON** — The Alberton West Prince Board of Trade's annual Aquatic Day at Alberton will have a 'new look' this year.

The program will begin Friday evening with a mammoth dance in the new government transit shed on Union wharf at Alberton South. The building will accommodate all who come to dance to the music of 'Paul and the Echoes.'

A feature will be the appearance of the dancer, and again on Saturday afternoon of attractive 19 year old Marie Knockwood, who was crowned queen of the Oyster Festival at Tyne Valley last year.

Aquatic Day will open officially on Saturday at 1:30 p.m. Speakers will include Robert E. Campbell, M.L.A., who will represent Premier Alex Campbell, and David MacDonald, M.P.

A special attraction of the day will be music by the Summerside Legion Concert Band under direction of Sgt. William Conkey. The band will play twice during the afternoon and in the evening from 7:30 to 8:45 will present a concert on the spacious lawn at the Westerner Motel.

Perhaps the highlight of Aquatic Day this year will be the arrival on Friday afternoon at Alberton South of the three 32 foot anti-submarine patrol craft under command of squadron commander Guy Comeau on board HMCS Mallard.
