At Theatre Next Week

There are two great attractions coming up next week at Confederation Centre Theatre. On Sunday evening Le Trio Baroque from Montreal will be playing a one-night stand there. This is the first of a series of Sunday Concerts scheduled for the Theatre during the summer months; twelve such programs, including such outstanding artists as John Vickers, Maurice Forrest, Glenn Gould, Lois Marshall, the National Youth Orchestra and the famous Oscar Peterson Jazz Trio, will grace the stage at 8:00 p.m. every Sunday night through this Centennial season.

An evening of 16th, 17th, and 18th century chamber music is in store for musicophiles in this Sunday's premiere. The trio, famous now throughout the world for its reproductions of the sounds and melodies of the Baroque era, consists of Mario Duchesne, flute and recorder, Melvin Bernan, oboe, and Kenneth Gilbert, harpsichord.

They will perform on the orchestra forestage of the versatile new theatre.

SPRING THAW

In the week following Le Trio Baroque will be playing one of Canada's best-known theatrical ventures so long as it is now 16 years since Mayor Moore invented the idea — that it could almost be called an institution. It is Spring Thaw, a satirical revue and play, after the end of the last war, Spring Thaw was rather modest affair, designed then to play only two nights in a theatre of tiny capacity.

The idea so caught on in its native city, Toronto, that every year since then the revue has been getting bigger and better. This year's selection of "The Best of Spring Thaw," composed of a collection of hit numbers mixed with topical additions, played in Vancouver's International Festival. This year Spring Thaw's finest began a tour in that city on January 21, which has crossed Canada and met with enthusiasm and ovations all the way.

Mayor Moore, the revue's producer and director (not to mention its main writer, etc.) is now in Charlottetown as artistic director for the Centennial celebration this summer. To him it will be welcoming home an old friend, seeing the cast with his show here.
