## 4 Charitable Bequests Made

**SUMMERSIDE** — The will of the late Roberta MacKevie provides for charitable bequests to the Summerside Presbyterian Church, the Summerside School Board, the Prince of Wales Hospital, \$10,000; and the Protestant Orphanage \$5,000.  
Summerside Presbyterian Church may use the money to pay off the mortgage of the MacKevie property purchased a year ago, or for other purposes.  
The bequest to the School Board must be used for a scholarship fund. It will be known as the Roberta MacKevie Scholarship Fund. Summerside Presbyterian also has completed their domain at Summerside High School and must lack sufficient funds to continue at a university without a scholarship. The Prince County Hospital's bequest may be used at the discretion of the trustees.

Fire was discovered blazing out through the upstairs kitchen window of the building at about 11 a.m. and only quick and knowledgeable action by the fire department prevented a much greater loss.  
The upstairs apartment unoccupied at the time of the fire, rented by Flying Officer and Mrs. D.C. Andrews. The origin of the fire was undetermined.  
The downstairs dry cleaning plant suffered a smoke and fire damage but is expected to be in operation as usual today.

## Blustery Day Is Forecast

Winds were increasing and temperatures falling rapidly late last night indicative of a blustery day today. Scattered snow (bursts and high winds) was the prediction.  
The weather picture over the weekend was a wet one with some 1.5 inches of snow and rain falling in a 24-hour period. The temperature reached a high of 41 and dropped to a low of 25. At midnight last night the temperature was 29 and dropping at the rate of about three degrees per hour.  
Winds were light both Saturday and Sunday being in the high 20's at the most and there were periods of no wind at all. They gusted as high as 28, but for today it is expected that all gusts of 40 would be recorded. The wind direction was generally north-west.
