Stepped Up Ferry Service Not Expected

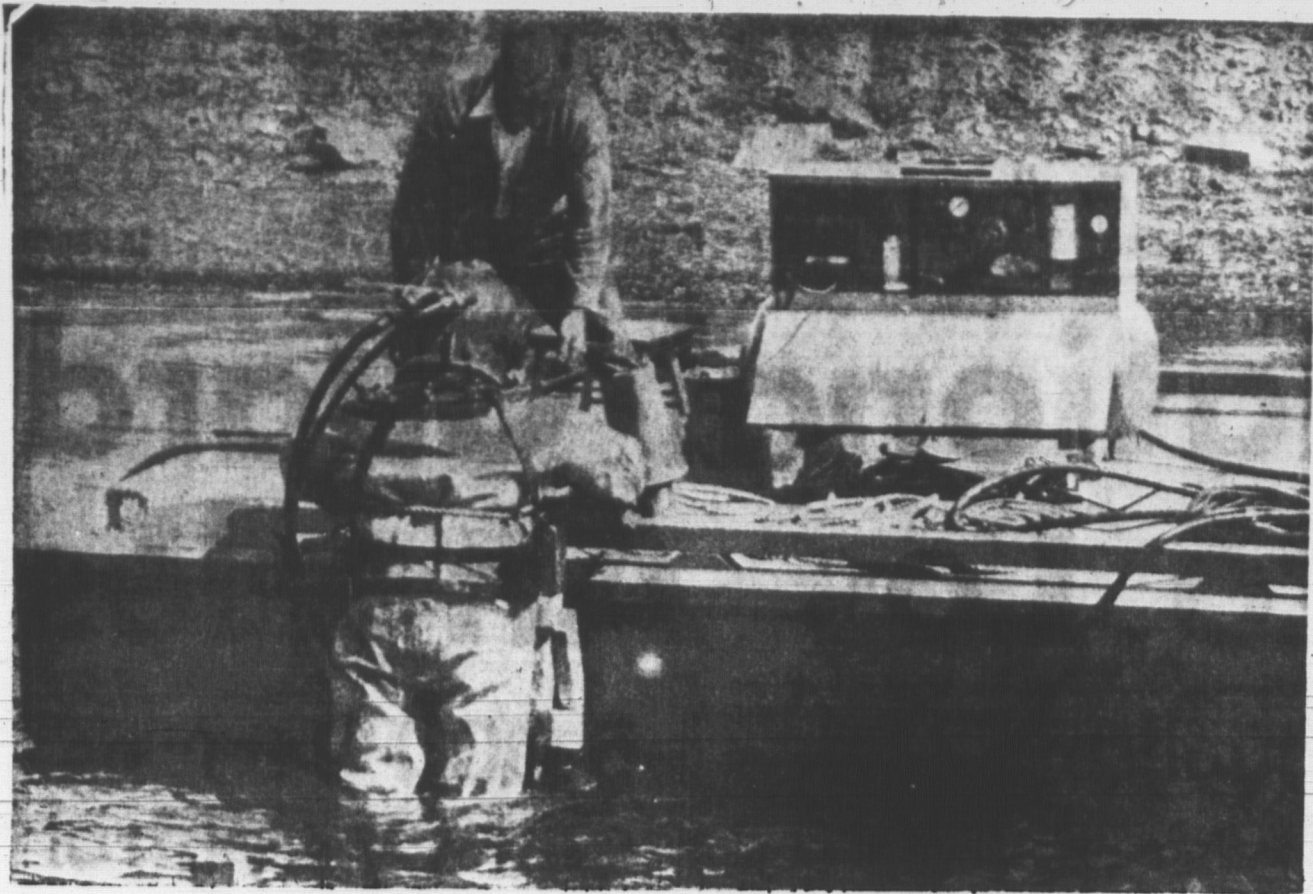
Unless extra traffic warrants it, the province's ferry services will not step up their schedules during Old Home Week.

COMMERCIAL DIVER AIDS MARINE SLIP CONSTRUCTION

The new marine railway slip at Alberton south is nearing completion and is expected to

be ready for operation in approximately a month according to J. H. England of Atlantic Enterprises Ltd. The difficult task of placing underwater cement forms is being carried out by a commercial "hard hat" diver, Alberic Ruault, a native of St. Pierre Island.

Ruault has just emerged from the water wearing his bulky diving suit, a 60-pound belt and 15 pound boots. Also shown on the diving tender is Clarence Wedge of St. Louis who, besides his other duties, acts as interpreter for the diver who speaks very little English. The railway slip is 200 feet in length with an additional 15 feet of cement work and has a capacity of 100 tons. The slip will be used by the boat building firm of Alberton Industries Ltd.

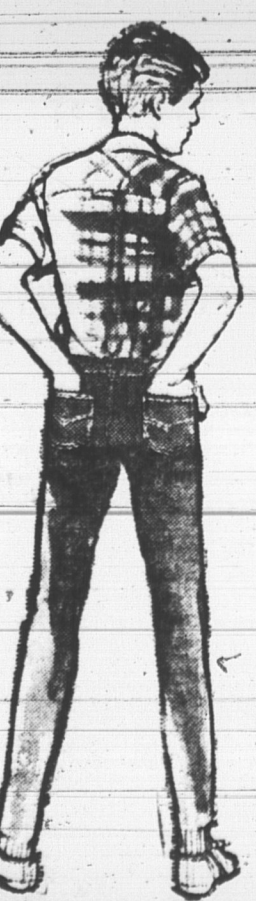

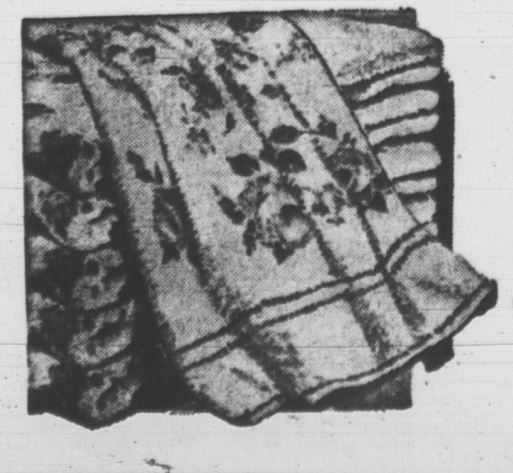

P.E.I. Plowing Match '65 Boasts Four New Events

A Queen of the Furrows will be crowned this year at the annual prize meet of the Prince Edward Island Plowing Match and Agricultural Fair Association at Dundas. Other features of the 25th anniversary celebration of the plowing match include two new matches for Island plowmen, and a championship tug-of-war match. Dates are September 8 and 9.

Also new this year is the fact that for the Ayrshire and Jersey cattle classes the Harry Hays formula will be used, which greatly increased the available prize money. It also restricts the number of sections.

There are only nine sections each of the Ayrshire and Jersey classes, and this compares with 33 in the other dairy breeds, including grade classes. But the prize money for the Ayrshires and Jerseys runs from \$18 for first through 10 placings, with \$4 for the 10th prize. The prize money available for the other dairy classes allows for only four money winners. The first prize is \$7 for the junior sections and goes as high as \$12 for senior females.

Most of the closest followers of this sport which has suddenly gained new popularity here, are looking for the keenest possible competition between the Red Point Farmers' Maritime champions last year, and the powerful St. Peter's team that won the championship at Dundas a year ago.

The Red Point club defeated the St. Peter's team in a tournament at St. Peter's earlier this summer but the rivalry will be as keen as ever if both clubs get to the finals of the tournament at Dundas.

There will be competition for heavyweight teams, and for lighter teams. The final decision has not yet been made on the men will set the equipment for weight division.

HYDRAULIC PLOWS

The bliss for hydraulic plows is one of the new plowing features at Dundas. In the past hydraulic plow classes were included in some Canadian plowing meets as a sort of handicap affair. It was thought that this type of plow could not compete with the trailer plows. But hydraulic plows have been winning world championships recently — they won in Austria last year, so the status of the hydraulic, or mounted plow, has changed considerably in the past few years.

A class for novice plowmen with tractor equipment is also new this year.

The Dundas people have built a new one-quarter mile running track this year and the sports for men and senior girls will be staged on Wednesday afternoon. The junior events will be contested on Thursday afternoon.

Toughest Competition
