WILL RETURN HOME—Bishop J. A. O'Sullivan of Charlottetown who left here two weeks ago for Rome, is at present in New York, having cancelled his proposed trip to the summer home of hostilities in Europe. His Excellency was to have sailed on the Mauretania. He is expected home this month and will probably visit Ontario en route.

IN HOSPITAL—Sergeant Joseph Kinslow of the Prince Edward Island Highlanders was taken to hospital yesterday with injuries received in an accident at the military camp here. While doing guard duty at the Exhibition grounds where his Battalion is quartered, Sergeant Kinslow was struck by an automobile and crushed against a fence. Hospital authorities said his condition was not serious.

ESCAPES INJURY—Occupants of two cars involved in an accident on the corner of Euston and Rochford Streets before midnight last night escaped serious injury, police said. The cars were damaged. Earlier in the day a 12-year-old boy was struck by a car on Longworth Avenue but escaped with bruises. The lad was riding on the rear of a milk wagon and jumped against the side of the car, police were told.

Y. M. C. A. MILITARY SERVICE—The local Y. M. C. A. established quarters yesterday in the main Building at the Exhibition Grounds. Repeating the service rendered in camps at home and abroad in the World War 1914-18, writing, paper, envelopes and reading material are supplied without charge and mail is accepted and posted by the Association. The Y. M. C. A. has received authority to post postage stamps thus providing a complete service for those wishing to write letters. Y. M. C. A. representatives indicate that the booth was kept busy yesterday during off parade periods.

Y'S MEN'S CONVENTION—The district convention of Maritime Y's Men held last Monday and Tuesday at Fredericton, N. B., was largely attended and successful in every way report the Island delegates who returned home last night. Those present from the Charlottetown Club were President Roy Oudmore, Vice President Ernest Bell, Secretary Edwin Johnstone, Harry Oudmore, Bert Simms, and Rev. H. L. Denton. From Summerside were Lindsay Willett, Dr. Hillard Clark and Willard Ouellette. The mascot cup was won by the Charlottetown delegates. R. G. Laughlin, Fredericton, was elected District Governor in succession to Bert Davis, Moncton. T. Kirk, Yarmouth, is the new Regional Director. It was decided to hold the 1940 convention at Summerside.

MacMillan, Leader of the Conservative Party; John Mustard and B. W. Robinson, members of the Legislative Assembly; Lieut.-Col. R. C. Chandler, Charlottetown City Councillor; Lieut.-Col. L. T. Lowther, Officer Commanding the P. E. I. Light Horse; Superintendent E. C. P. Salt of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police; and Lieut.-Col. P. S. Fielding. The first meeting will be held this afternoon in the legislative chamber of the Provincial Building here.

Island Pastor And Family Had Eventful Trip

The Rev. S. J. Boyce, Mrs. Boyce, and son John, and son-in-law, returned to Charlottetown on Saturday morning after an eventful trip from England on the C. P. R. liner Montrose. They arrived in Charlottetown yesterday en route for St. John's, Nfld., where Mr. Boyce resumes his ministry at the United Church there.

"We sailed from Greenock on Saturday afternoon, Aug. 26, and were about 800 miles out when, on Monday at 4:30, word was passed round the ship that we had to go back to Liverpool," Mr. Boyce told a Guardian representative yesterday. A notice was placed on the bulletin board advising that the vessel was ordered to return to the United Kingdom. The passengers, many of them refugees from Czechoslovakia and Poland, were greatly upset and many women became hysterical. However, the ship again turned her course six or seven hours later, and proceeded to Quebec without mishap. Black-out precautions were taken, and careful attention given to lifeboat drill.

The Montrose carried approximately 1,000 passengers, about twice the normal number, and every accommodation, including staterooms, was used for the duration of the trip. Meals had to be given in three sittings. Many joined the ship just at the last minute, after planning to sail on other vessels whose schedules had been cancelled. There was a large number of United States and Canadian citizens as well as European refugees. The latter had heartbreaking stories to tell of Nazi aggression.

Three hours after the arrival of the Montrose in Quebec, the Empress of Australia arrived with a large passenger list.

Provincial Red Cross Meeting Is Planned

The Executive of the Prince Edward Island Division, Canadian Red Cross Society, at a largely attended meeting held Tuesday afternoon decided to call a meeting of representatives of all organizations in the province, social, religious, fraternal, benevolent, etc., to be held on Monday, September 18th, in the Board Room of the City Building and is for the purpose of augmenting the present Executive membership from the different parts of the Province in order to deal with Red Cross affairs in time of war or emergency.

The National Council of the Canadian Red Cross is to hold a special meeting at Rideau Hall, Ottawa, on Tuesday, September 12th. Hon. Dr. W. F. MacMillan, the Prince Edward Island representative on the Council, will attend this meeting after which detailed information as to the war-time activities to be carried on by the Red Cross will be outlined.

Almost 170 women have already signified their willingness to serve in different capacities should the necessity arise, and forms are now available for those who wish to offer their services. So far no men have volunteered, although, as they are equally eligible it is hoped they too will register.

Former Island Pastor And Family Had Eventful Trip

Among the survivors of the ill-fated liner Athena torpedoed off the coast of Scotland, on Sunday, September 3, 1939, are Mrs. Frances Wood McPherson and Mrs. MacPherson, who were returning to Canada, after having spent the last year in Scotland. Rev. Mr. McPherson had been granted a Travelling Scholarship from Toronto University, and was attending Edinburgh University. He is a graduate of Prince of Wales College, St. Allison's University, and United Theological College, Montreal, having won high honors in each of these institutions. He is a son of Mr. John A. McPherson, G. Wood, Lot 8, Prince County, and Mrs. McPherson a native of Canterbury, New Brunswick. They are among the survivors picked up by the Knut Nelson and landed at Galway, Ire. Their many friends here are delighted to hear of their rescue, and wish for them a less harrowing trip upon their next venture to return to their homeland.
