

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

Y. M. C. A.—Song Service at the Gospel Meeting tomorrow afternoon at 3.45. Strangers always welcome.

ST. PETERS HALL.—It is seldom that so varied and so good a programme is offered to the public as that printed elsewhere in this issue for the concert in St. Peter's Hall next Tuesday evening. Read it.

GOSPEL MEETING.—Remember the Gospel meeting in the Y. M. C. A. Hall Sunday afternoon at 4 o'clock, conducted by the railway men. Strangers always welcome. Lesson—Psalms, 91-15, "I will be with him in trouble."

OMISSION.—In yesterday's report of the concert in St. Paul's schoolroom a reading by Miss Kathleen Fitzgerald was unwittingly omitted. This young lady is fast becoming a favorite with Charlottetown audiences and her reading on Thursday night was highly appreciated. Also Mr. Ernest Earle's cornet solo which was exceptionally well rendered, he receiving a vociferous encore to which he failed to respond.

NEW SYSTEM OF INSURANCE.—A new system of insurance has been introduced by the Halifax Tram Company. All their employees are insured for \$1,000 each. The company pays half the premiums and the employee the other half. Each week three-fourths of a cent on a dollar is taken from their wages, hence a man earning \$10 a week has to pay 7½ cents from that sum, in case of sickness \$5 a week is allowed, and if a hand or foot is amputated, the result of an accident the injured man receives \$1,000.

STOCK SHIPMENTS.—On Wednesday last, Mr. S. H. Jones shipped from here 700 sheep and lambs, including two cars of fat sheep for export to Liverpool, G. B. The balance of the consignment went to the Boston markets.

On Thursday, Mr. Jones shipped about two hundred, and Mr. W. F. Wheeler, shipped over three hundred to Somerville, Mass.

Yesterday morning, Mr. Jones shipped 210, and Mr. C. A. McNutt, Kensington, shipped 180 to Messrs. J. A. Leaman & Co., Halifax.—Summerside Agriculturist.

EGGS ON TAP.—We understand that Italian dealers are sending eggs to London, Eng., quite ready for the use of pastry cooks, restaurants, cafes and hotels. Instead of having to break each egg separately, and with care lest the shell become mixed with it, the cook has simply to turn a tap and let as much egg flow into a basin as may be required for culinary purposes. About one hundred at a time are sent in the tins, hermetically sealed, the greatest care being taken in selecting them, as the loss to the exporter, if a single musty or bad egg should get into a tin, would be serious. This new departure is said to be meeting with great favor among the leading chefs, and opens a new future for surplus hen fruit.

SHEDIAC'S POTATOE TRADE.—Mr. C. C. Hamilton, of Shediac, was in Moncton on Thursday, on his way to Halifax on a business trip. Mr. Hamilton says the reports of the activity in the potato business are not exaggerated. Indeed, he thinks the purchases will reach between 60,000 and 70,000 barrels, or nearly 200,000 bushels. The buyers paid \$1 a barrel for some time, but the price is now 90 cents. Nearly all the potatoes shipped will go to the West Indies and Bermuda. This trade has developed wonderfully in the last few years, though it commenced nearly 20 years ago in a comparatively small way. Now there seven or eight warehouses mostly frost proof and some of very large size with stone basements. This business is a great boon for the farmers for miles around.—Moncton Times.
