Ceiling On Farming Loans Boosted To \$20 Million In Legislation Disclosed

By HAROLD MORRISON OTTAWA (CP) — The government plans to boost the ceiling on individual long-term farm mortgage loans to \$20 million from \$15,000 under a new "supervised" credit program, informants disclosed Monday.

The new program would be undertaken under the direct supervision of Agriculture Minister Harkness and would involve scrapping of the present Canadian Farm Loan Board which reports to Finance Minister Fleming.

The federal pattern seems to be one of expanding farm credit generally, with a split of jurisdiction between Mr. Harkness and Mr. Fleming.

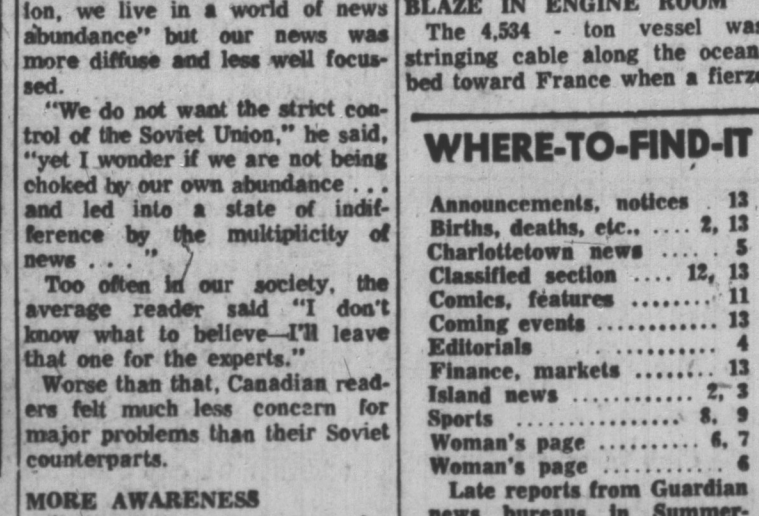
OTTAWA (CP) — Reported cases of paralytic polio this year up to June 6 totalled 23, compared with 27 in the corresponding period last year, the federal health department said Monday.

There were five deaths from polio in the period, four of them in the Northwest Territories and one in Ontario, compared with three a year ago — one each in New Brunswick, Quebec and British Columbia.

The Territories reported nine polio cases. There were eight in Quebec, three in Ontario, one in Manitoba and two in Alberta.
