

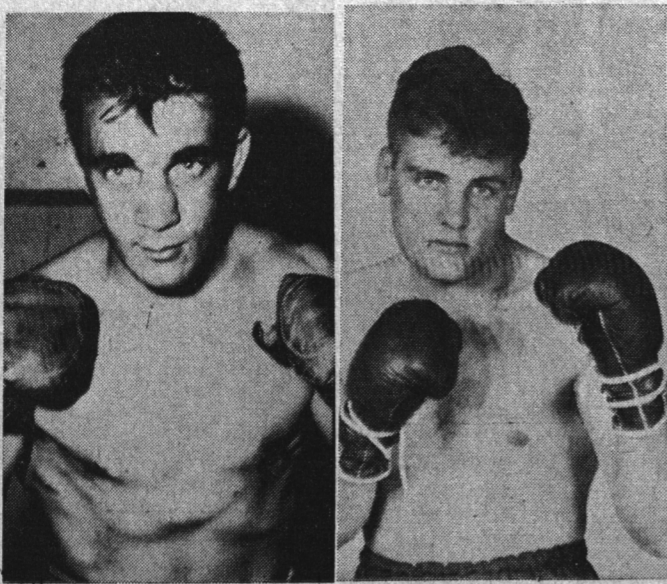
Gaston Roy, Tiger Steele Clash At Stadium Tonight

SUMMERSIDE — Two of the most rugged fighters in the Maritimes will be showing their wares at Civic Stadium tonight when Gaston Roy and "Tiger" Steele answer the opening bell for the main bout of the evening.

Both these boys are used to toe-to-toe slugfests and there isn't a question but that this fray will be filled with knock-em-down, and drag-em-out action.

In spite of the assurance that this go will be a torrid one, there is a possibility that the semi-final featuring "Peanuts" Arsenault and "Sluggo" Turnbull of New Glasgow, may steal the show on the main events. At the end of their last fight here Turnbull was very dissatisfied with the decision, and vowed if they ever met again, he would take it out of the judges' hands, by sending Arsenault to the showers before the end of regulation time.

Ageless 'Satch' Paige Fails To Make Quota

MIAMI, Fla. (AP) — Leroy (Satchel) Paige, the Miami Marlins' pitcher, will have another three weeks to think about a possible sentence for speeding and driving without a Florida license.

Municipal Judge Charles H. Snowden sentenced Paige to 20 days in jail with one day off for every game he won for the Marlins, for every hit he made, every run he scored and every time he struck out Luke Easter.

Satchel, who admits to 50 years of age, finished the season with 10 victories, two hits and one run scored, leaving him with seven days to serve.

"I hadn't thought much about what I'm going to do about those remaining days," said Judge Snowden Sunday night. "Paige's deferred sentence comes up Oct. 1 so I probably won't have any decision until then."

Reds Give Way To Pirates 4-1

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Curt Raydon's first hit in the majors — a poke past first baseman George Crowe in the fifth inning — ignited a three run rally for a 4 to 1 Pittsburgh triumph over night.

Roberto Clemente, the Pirates' fleet-footed rightfielder, slammed three straight triples to tie a modern major league record for one game.

Raydon won his eighth game against four defeats. He needed help from southpaw Don Gross in the seventh after two errors by first baseman Dick Stuart loaded the sacks and led to the Redlegs' only run.

STARTS SPLURGE

Raydon, who hadn't had a hit in 35 previous trips, drove the ball past Crowe after Billy Hall

doubled with two out. Crowe retrieved and threw wild over Smokey Burgess' head, and Hall scored.

Bill Virdon then doubled, driving in Raydon, and Clemente followed with his second triple to score Virdon. Clemente was out at the plate, trying for an inside-the-park home run.

Clemente led off the fourth with a triple to deep left field but Tom Acker slammed the door on the Pirates, striking out Stuart and Bob Skinner and getting Frank Thomas on a fly to right.

With two out in the eighth, Clemente rifled his third triple to deep center and scored on Stuart's single.

The Redlegs got only four hits — all off Raydon.

Althea Gibson Wins Title; Retires For Singing Career

FOREST HILLS, N.Y. (AP) — Althea Gibson saved her tottering tennis throne with a comeback victory over Darlene Hard in the U.S. finals Sunday and then, in a surprising move, relinquished it for a singing career.

"I may never play tournament tennis again," the gangling Harlem girl said after beating Miss Hard, a bouncy ex-waitress from Montebello, Calif., 3-6, 6-1, 6-2, for her second straight American championship.

Australia's Ashley Cooper reversed the result of the 1957 final and won the men's championship with a brilliant, come-from-behind triumph over his Davis Cup teammate, Mal Anderson, 6-2, 3-6, 4-6, 10-8, 8-6.

He accomplished the feat after injuring his right ankle in the 12th game of the final set.

RARE TRIPLE

The phlegmatic man from Melbourne thus completed a rare "triple"—the Australian, Wimbledon and U.S. crowns in a single year. The match produced brilliant, dramatic tennis — particularly in the final two sets—between two players who seemed to anticipate each other's every move.

Saturday, Cooper downed teammate Neale Fraser for the 11th straight time and Anderson triumphed over Sweden's Ulf

Schmidt.

The announcement of Althea's retirement was made at an informal press conference.

Asked if she would be open to a professional tennis offer if one came from promoter Jack Kramer, Miss Gibson said, "We would consider it." She quickly added that no offer had been made.

Al Player Leads In Scoring Race

TORONTO (CP) — Halfback Joel Wells of Montreal Alouettes has taken an early lead in the Big Four football scoring race. The 23-year-old second-year import has amassed 24 points on four touchdowns.

Gerry McDougall, hard-hitting Hamilton Tiger-Cat halfback who led the league in ground-gaining last season, is second with 23 points on three touchdowns, a convert, a field goal and a single.

Four players are tied for third place with 18 points each on three touchdowns. They are halfbacks George Brancato of Ottawa Rough Riders, Dave Mann and C. R. Roberts of Toronto Argonauts and Tommy Grant of Hamilton.

Hal Patterson, outstanding pass-catching end with the Alouettes who won the league scoring championship last season with 78 points, has yet to score this year.

West, former Big Four Backfielder with Argonauts, has quarter Gino Cappelletti of Sarnia Golden Bears. Cappelletti has a two-point lead over import kicked two field goals, four converts and a six singles.

downs each. They are Albert Richmond of Detroit Raiders, Bernie Custis of Kitchener-Waterloo and Ed Mitchell of Kitchener-Waterloo.

World Series Start Oct. 1st.

CHICAGO (AP) — The 1958 World Series will start Wednesday, Oct. 1 in the city of the National League pennant winner, almost certainly Milwaukee, commissioner Ford Frick announced Monday.

Should the Braves and New York Yankees capture the flags in their respective leagues, as anticipated, the first and second games, on Oct. 1 and 2, will be played in County Stadium, Milwaukee.

The third, fourth and fifth games, Oct. 4, 5, 6, would be played in Yankee Stadium. Friday, Oct. 3, will be a day set aside for travel, as will Tuesday Oct. 7, if the series goes beyond five games. A six or seven-game series will bring the contestants back to Milwaukee for games Oct. 8 and 9.

Should a miracle occur and the series be played between New York and Pittsburgh, or Chicago and Milwaukee, no days will be set aside for travel.

All games will start at 1 p.m. local time, except the Sunday contest in New York, which will start at 2 p.m.

Charles, Jackson Should Never Fight Again

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — Former heavyweight champion Edward Charles should never fight again, delegates to the National Boxing Association convention decided Monday.

And, they said, neither should former heavyweight contender Tommy (Hurricane) Jackson.

The delegates unanimously adopted resolutions recommending that state NBA commissions suspend both boxers if they try to fight again. They held that neither man is physically fit to enter the ring.

The resolution dealing with Charles was introduced by John H. Saunders, secretary of the Pennsylvania Boxing Commission. The one dealing with Jackson was introduced by Jean Le Tourneau of Quebec.
