Rossiter Replies To Nfld. Complaint

Pointing out that this province was always ready to co-operate fully with other Atlantic Provinces, Hon. Leo Rossiter, minister of industry and natural resources, referred briefly to an editorial appearing recently in a St. John's

Newfoundland daily. The editorial noting that Newfoundland was prohibited from subsidizing its products by the Terms of Union, objected to the government shipping subsidy on Prince Edward Island farm products shipped from here to their province.

(Continued from page 1) serving a limited exclusively rural area is proposed on a trial basis with future expansion as success indicates is needed. In what is termed the 'home strengthening services' there is provision suggested for adequately trained social work staff to counsel and supervise the home in planning an appropriate program for the retarded child.

Mr. Rossiter emphasized that this subsidy was designed as much to help the people of Newfoundland as those of this province. He said if it were not for the subsidy the people there would be forced to pay approximately \$30,000 more per year for the things they purchase here. However, the minister stated he fully realized that there were certain times when the Newfoundland crops were being marketed when the importing of P.E.I. products might be considered unfair competition by Newfoundland growers.

FOSTER HOME

This proposed staff would also find and counsel foster homes, supervise integration of the retarded into the community and provide group counselling or group therapy facilities for parents. There are several basic principles underlying the suggested program. From emphasis placed on it by the report it is evident that home is of primary importance. For this reason the desirability of locating 'foster' homes is stressed in preference to institutions.

To prove the goodwill of this government Mr. Rossiter said he was perfectly willing to hold back such Island products during the peak Newfoundland and marketing period. "Newfoundland and its people are too good friends for us to wish to do anything which might be construed as designed to injure them in any way," the minister stated.

Red-Controlled B.C. Union Said Undermining Industry

The fantastic demands of the Communist-controlled fishermen's union was rapidly undermining the rich fishing industry of British Columbia, R.T. Hager, president of the Fisheries Council of Canada said in Charlottetown last night.

Mr. Hager, who is also president of the Canadian Fishing Company of Vancouver, B.C., said that union pressure had capitated the famous British Columbia salmon into the luxury food class. At 55-58 cents per half-pound tin it had lost its traditional position as a poor man's food.

Guest speaker at the annual dinner of the Prince Edward Island Fisheries Federation, Mr. Hager was introduced by Gordon O'Brien of Ottawa, manager of the Fisheries Council of Canada and thanked by J.E. Burden, retiring president of the organization.

Hon. Leo F. Rossiter, provincial minister of fisheries and Ray Kinsella of the federal Trade and Commerce department also spoke briefly.

Immediately prior to the adjournment of the meeting, Mr. Burden, on behalf of the local federation, presented a large-size painting of Covehead Harbor to Mr. Hager. The artist was Barry Burden.

Mr. Hager said he did not mean to imply that all the fishermen of British Columbia were communists; perhaps only one per cent of their number or less were of this persuasion. But there was a hard core of dedicated party men firmly in the saddle.

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the height of the 1958 season was estimated to have decreased salmon production by 250,000 cases.

For this and other reasons the total salmon production in 1958 was down 1,000,000 pounds, he said.
With the world population jumping at the rate of 50,000,000 each year, Mr. Hager envisaged greatly increased international competition for all types of seafood.

CHANGES SOUGHT
One indication of this trend was the pressure for extension of territorial waters, he said. Some nations asked that the present limit of three miles be extended to six, others sought a 12-mile extension while one or two (Chile and Ecuador) would settle for nothing less than a 200-mile limit.

Because of her proximity to the famous Grand Banks and Northwest Pacific fishing grounds, Canada was particularly fortunate in this regard, the guest speaker noted.

In addition, the west coast fishermen had the protection of valuable international treaties which regulated salmon and halibut fishing, he said.
Effective government controls also helped with the development of the industry which last year was worth \$2 billion dollars in Canada.

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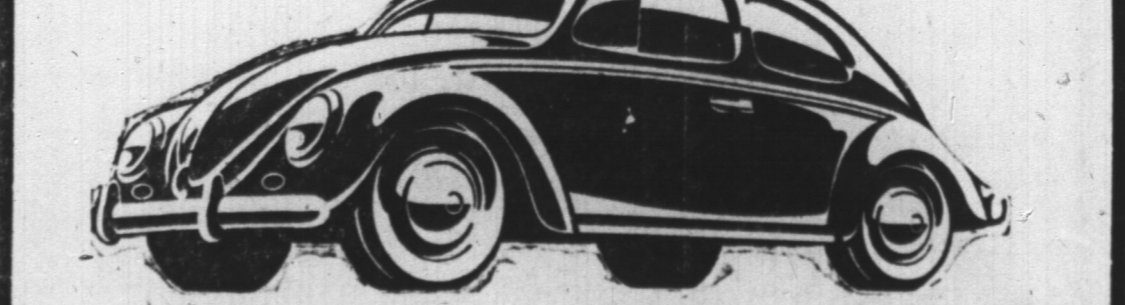
