Funeral Of William John Caseley

—His tragic death (the result of brain injury, caused by a motoring accident), brought unspeakable sorrow to the family and friends of William John Caseley, who passed away at his home at Kelvin Grove, on Saturday morning, September 17th, 1950.

"Billy" who had just passed his 18th birthday, was the first born son of Mr. and Mrs. Morris Caseley, nee Doris MacPherson, and had received his education at Kelvin Grove School, Kensington High and Truro Agriculture College. Having a love of the soil, he had to a certain extent, taken over the management of farming operations at home, where his devotion to his work and his dependability enhanced his status as elder son and gave every promise of integrity and strength of character, when he would have come into the greater responsibilities of full-fledged manhood.

His sunny, even temperament and fun loving but kindly nature made him a general favorite with old and young, and he was (to quote from a letter written to the parents) "known and loved, perhaps unknowingly, far beyond his home".
