

# Millionaires Pull Up Sox, Down Islanders 6-2 Before 2,000 Fans

SYDNEY, N.S., Nov. 14 — (CP) — Threatened by fine, suspension and the combined wrath of head office and fandom, Sydney Millionaires broke a two week long starvation stand by wanking Charlottetown Islanders 6-2 before 2,066 Maritime Major Hockey League fans here tonight.

For Millionaires it was their second home ice victory over the Maritime Major League championship competitors of last season and represented a boost out of sole cellar occupancy. They now are tied with Halifax St. Mary's at the bottom of the six-team ladder.

Millionaires showed a new determination from the start, out-shouldering the Islanders in a fast, hard-hitting first period in which they took a 3-1 lead. Islanders marked their checks closer in the second and third periods but showed respect for a tight Sydney defence that leaned heavily on incoming traffic.

Charlottetown goalkeeper Hank Gordon stopped three point blank shots before Alex Birukow broke the ice at 2:14 of the first period. Islanders marched back within a minute and 14 seconds to effect a tie when Johnny Morrow ticked home a blue line slap shot from Larry Travis.

A high sticking penalty to Charlottetown defenceman George McLagan at 8:40 settled the victory trend. Birukow took a spot pass from Earl Frezell and looped it over Gordon's shoulder at 9:01 and 40 seconds later Frezell rapped another close shot to give Millionaires a 3-1 advantage.

Heavier ice slowed attacks both ways in the second period. Millionaires registered the only goal of the period at 11:27 when George Robertson roamed free from the right side with Don McRae's pass to jam the puck between Gordon's right pad and the post.

The score came with Sydney's Dunc MacIntyre and Dean MacBride in the penalty box with Islanders' Larry Travis.

Bill Cupolo intercepted a Charlottetown clearance, whirled around the right side of the defence and fooled Gordon with a quick rising shot at 7:38 of the third period to run the advantage to 5-1. Ed (Whitey) Prokop added the sixth seven minutes later by slapping Birukow's hand-out from the back boards.

Buck Whitlock, one of Islanders' most dangerous attackers, shot Islanders last tally after a thrilling defence hurdling effort.

Millionaires had a 34-16 shooting advantage, a fair indication of the offensive pattern. Goalkeeper Nick Pidsodny and Hal Gordon were outstanding.

# Jimmy Carter Retains Title

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 14 — (AP) — Jimmy Carter of New York retained his world lightweight championship tonight when he handed his No. 1 challenger, Art Aragon of Los Angeles, a brutal beating for a unanimous decision at the end of 15 rounds.

Carter, making the first defence of the title he won from Ike Williams last May 26, floored the wild, golden boy twice and was meeting out heavy punishment in the closing rounds of a vicious fight. Decisively reversing a 10-round decision accorded Aragon here last August in a non-title scrap, the 27-year-old Gotham Negro won the verdict of referee Mushy Callahan and the two judges, Joe Stone and Frankie Van.

Aragon, the 24-year-old idol of the latin colony here, put up a gallant battle, particularly in the first stages of the fight. But he wilted under the preliminary body attack launched by the champion and all but went out via a knock-out in the 14th round, when it looked as if the match might be stopped. Both fighters weighed in at 104 1/2.

# Boxer's Widow Starts \$500,000 Damages Suit

NEW YORK, Nov. 14 — (AP) — A \$500,000 damage suit on behalf of the widow of George Flores, welterweight boxer fatally injured in the ring, was filed in state supreme court today against the International Boxing Club of New York and Madison Square Garden as promoters of the bout.

Lawyers for Elaine Flores, 18, the widow, said she held that the club were unsafe and inadequate. The 20-year-old Flores died four days after he was knocked out in the eighth round of a bout with Roger Donoghue in Madison Square Garden Aug. 29.

The action seeks \$250,000 for "personal injuries to George Flores" and the same amount for damages "on behalf of his wife."

The lawyers said they would stress the time element between bouts in arguing their case. They said Flores, prior to his fatal bout on Aug. 29, was knocked out on Aug. 14 in another bout with Donoghue and on July 31 in a bout with John Cerky.

# Islanders Seek To Halt Beavers' Winning Streak Here Tonight

The Charlottetown Islanders will attempt to put a crimp in the winning streak of the Saint John Beavers tonight when the two teams meet at the Forum in a game that is expected to draw a full house.

Losers in only two of their 17 games the Beavers possess a 10 point lead over the second place Glace Bay Miners and 11 points over the third place Islanders. A win for the Islanders will put them into second place one point above the Miners.

Fans will have their chance to get a look at Pete Langelie, the former dippy-side artist of the Toronto Maple Leafs who joined the Beavers a little over a week ago.

There's more good news for the fans tonight in that Johnny Dutchak will be back to strengthen the defence corps. Johnny returns from an attack of the flu which sent him to hospital for several days.

A win for the Islanders tonight would be doubly sweet after their loss at Sydney last night. Veteran observers rate the Islanders as the only team in the league that can match the Beavers although Sydney Millionaires also draw strong support in some circles.

# Ottawa Rough Riders Down Hamilton 17 To 7

HAMILTON, Nov. 14 — (CP) — Ottawa Rough Riders, an apparently whipped club for 94 minutes struck through the air and over the ground in a six-minute victory gallop to overwhelm Hamilton Tiger-Cats 17-7 today in the opening game of their home-and-home total-points Big Four football playoff. A Tiger-Cat miscue started the scoring spurge.

About 10,000 fans paraded into Civic Stadium for this big one and they were set to wince Tiger-Cats into the finale at Ottawa Saturday with a 7-1 lead when Riders pulled out the stops.

Benny MacDonnell, hard-hitting son of Ottawa's police chief, and Howie (Touchdown) Turner drove into pay dirt in the three-touchdown fourth-quarter spurge. They shared the hero's role with quarter Tom O'Malley, Alton Baldwin and Blake Taylor while the goat, if there must be one is Tiger Bernie Custis.

The game, played on a muddy field under brilliant skies and with a strong cross-wind bothering the kickers, wasn't a thriller but it will go down in football history in Eastern Canada as the "steal" of the year. Spider Gibson, hard-tackling Tiger backfielder, was the culprit in a bare-faced theft that gave Hamilton its only touchdown.

The Gibson manoeuvre came in the second quarter when he grabbed the ball from Joe Asquini's arms on the Ottawa one-yard line and smacked over for the five points. That appeared to be the margin of victory, along with Tip Logan's convert and Cam Fraser's single, until Riders let loose.

# Top Track And Field Man For 1951 Selected

MONTREAL, Nov. 14 — (CP) — Don Scott McEwen of Ottawa was named tonight winner of the J. W. Davies Trophy as the outstanding Canadian track and field man for 1951.

The announcement was made by Tom Lord, chairman of the National Track and Field Committee of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada.

The selection was made through a small vote of committee members.

McEwen, Canada's No. 1 Olympic prospect and now a star of the University of Michigan's track team, won the award easily over Bill Farnell, last year's winner, and Jack Hutchins, both star British Columbia middle-distance men, and Ed Bretta of Toronto, Canada's leading pole vaulter.
