HUNTER'S CORNER

Many Partridges Seen During Recent Cold Snap

The recent spell of tough winter weather sure threw our Hungarian partridge into prominence. Covies are being reported from every district. One motorist at Cherry Valley reported sighting two covies, each an approximate 16 in number, within a half mile of each other.

A pair of Snowy Owls in the Orwell Cove district are reported to be giving the two large covies of Huns in 'The Cove' some trouble. They are taking the odd bird and neither covey is as large as they were at the beginning of winter. On occasion they vary their Hun and mouse diet with a full course meal on Plymouth Rock hens. One farmer lost two in a week. He has a trusty double 12 gauge shotgun ready but to date has not had an opportunity to even the score. Snowies also vary their diet with field mice of which there is no scarcity.

The rabbit season is nearing its end on January 30th. The thirty-first falls on a Sunday when hunting is not allowed. A number of rabbit hunters claim they are bagging as many rabbits as formerly and there is no scarcity of targets. Several claim they have shot well over the one hundred mark each this season. Rabbits are in 'pockets' this winter a sure sign they are feeling the pinch. They are feeding to congest in a certain favourable swamp and a lot of territory surrounding this spot is practically devoid of bunnies.

A rabbit hunter who travels extensively told me this week that they are only feeling themselves with their contention that rabbits are as plentiful as formerly. He has travelled many miles this month and told me that he keeps his eyes open for rabbit tracks when driving past a swamp or through wooded terrain. He told me that there was just the odd track and no beaten trails as in former years. A few rabbits can make a lot of tracks and when there is just the odd track they are really scarce. One afternoon this winter I had occasion to accompany a chap on a sixty mile journey through former top rabbit terrain. It hadn't snowed for three days and there should have been hard packed trails across the highway or along its border between the road and woodland. I never spotted a beaten trail and the best I saw wasn't any better than a three tracker. Single tracks were the order of the day.

MONTREAL (CP) - Toronto Maple Leafs climbed to within one point of the staggering Canadiens Thursday night, whipping second-place Montreal 5-3 on a pair of goals within an 11-second span midway through the final period of their National Hockey League game. Bobby Pulford scored the winner, his second of the game and 14th this season, at 9:20 of the finale and rookie Peter Stenkowski scored his first NHL goal 11 seconds later to wrap up Toronto's seventh game with out a loss. Pulford gave the Leafs a 1-0 lead in the first period but the teams were left deadlocked 3-3 after a barrage of five goals in the middle frame, three goals coming within a span of less than two minutes.

Oliver Scores Hat Trick As Bruins Whip Rangers

BOSTON (AP)—Murray Oliver scored three goals Thursday night to give the Boston Bruins a 5-2 National Hockey League victory over the New York Rangers.

It was the first hat trick for the cellar-dwelling Bruins this year and the first for Oliver since Dec. 23, 1961. Oliver also had an assist on the fifth Boston goal.

Though Boston has won only 10 games this season, the victory over New York was the third win in a row on home ice for the Bruins, who previously beat Detroit and Toronto.

Oliver's first goal opened the scoring. He converted a pass across the goal mouth from Wayne Rivers while New York goalie Jacques Plante was down.

His other two goals came in the second period, tying the score at 2-2, then putting Boston in front for keeps.

Teddy Green set up the first goal, stickhandling around the net and passing in front where Oliver had Plante beaten. At 17:08 Oliver converted a pass

out from the corner by Johnny Bucyk before Plante could recover.

Bill Knibbs and Rivers scored for Boston in the final period. New York took a 2-1 lead in the second period on the second goal of the night by Bob Nevin,

whose shot broke through goalie Ed Johnston's glove.

Nevin scored in the first period on a screened shot that went through Johnston's legs as he dove sideways.
