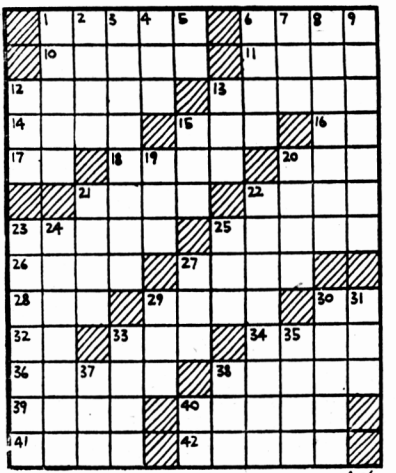

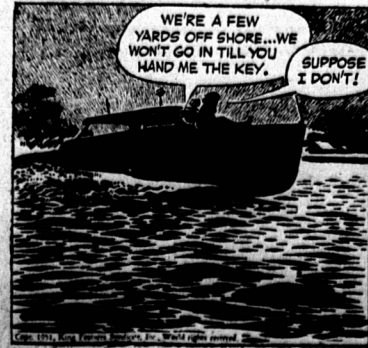

THE CRUCIAL FIRST PLAY

South's play at the first trick in the following hand was the key to success or failure.

South dealer. Both sides vulnerable.

♠ A 6
 ♥ K 10 5
 ♦ 10 8 6
 ♣ A 5 4 3 2

♠ J 8 7 4
 ♥ 6 3
 ♦ K 9
 ♣ K 8 6 4

♠ K 5 2

The bidding:

South held, with some reason, that he had too much for a mere two-diamond rebid over his partner's two clubs, and so he elected to make the far stronger rebid of two notrump. This was an unfortunate decision; if South had chosen to rebid his suit, North undoubtedly would have bid two notrump, and with the opening lead coming from East, it was scarcely possible for him to be defeated at a three-notrump contract.

South also should have won out, but the opening lead gave him the chance to go wrong, and he seized the opportunity! West opened the spade four, and went out much thought, South played low from dummy.

It was a fatal bit of carelessness! East put up the spade king, and on the sound suspicion that South had the spade queen, shifted to the queen of clubs. This shift spelled the doom of the contract. South twice held up the
