

**Educational Meeting Held At Tignish**

A meeting sponsored by the Department of Education was held in St. Mary's Hall, Tignish, on Wednesday evening, April 28th. Joseph B. Morrissey presided. In his opening remarks Dr. L. W. Shaw explained that the meeting was called to discuss with the people of this area the problems that are becoming more and more important with the passing of each year. He told how some years ago only a small percentage of the pupils who wished to become doctors, lawyers and clergymen pursued their studies past grade eight while those who intended to become farmers and fishermen often quit school even before attaining a grade eight education. "Today conditions are much different," he said, "as nearly everyone regardless of what calling he intends to follow needs at least a high school education." Thus this brings up the problem of providing high school facilities for the many children from the twenty or more rural districts in this area.

Dr. Shaw told how it is impossible to teach these high school grades in the country schools so some system must be worked out which would provide some means of bringing these rural children to some central school where these grades could be taught. He asked for the opinion of those present to help the Department of Education in reaching a decision. Mr. Malcolm MacKenzie, assistant director of education divided the audience into twelve discussion groups to discuss the question, "What would you do to improve education if you did not have to worry about the cost?"

Mr. M. E. Callaghan in his summary of the group findings reported that the majority were of the opinion that "better trained teachers is the biggest problem" followed closely in turn by "removing grades eight and nine from the rural schools" and "better school buildings and equipment provided."

Mr. MacKenzie then asked the group to re-form and write out any question they wished to ask; then Dr. Shaw and he would try to give the answers. This scheme brought out many of the questions that have been troubling many people for some time and showed how those present were glad to have an opportunity to ask them.

After the question and answer period the chairman called upon Rev. J. A. MacDonald, P.F., to address the meeting. Father MacDonald told how it is pleasing to see the Director of Education and his assistant discussing educational problems with the people here present and hoped some solution of these problems could be worked out.

In concluding Father MacDonald said, "It is a great pleasure to move a sincere vote of thanks to Dr. Shaw and Mr. MacKenzie for coming to this meeting and showing such an interest in the problems of this area."

Mr. Charles Gavin in seconding the vote of thanks said "he hoped further meetings could be held in the future to further discuss our problems."

The motion was put to the meeting by the chairman and carried unanimously. It was presented to the speakers by Mr. Morrissey.

Mr. Shaw in thanking the vote of thanks assured his audience that he was pleased to be here to discuss problems and promised to come again.

**C.P.R. To Lay Off Another 43 Men**

WINNIPEG, (CP) — Canadian Pacific Railways officials announced Thursday a further lay-off of about 43 men in their Western shops. Officials said the lay-off was necessary because of the reduction in freight traffic during the last few months. About 30 men were laid off in the same shops three weeks ago. The announcement Thursday said some of the employees laid off will have the opportunity to get other jobs with the CPR.

Mrs. George Sweet who has been spending the winter months with her daughter Lois in Montreal, has returned to her home in Woodstock. Her many friends are welcoming her back.

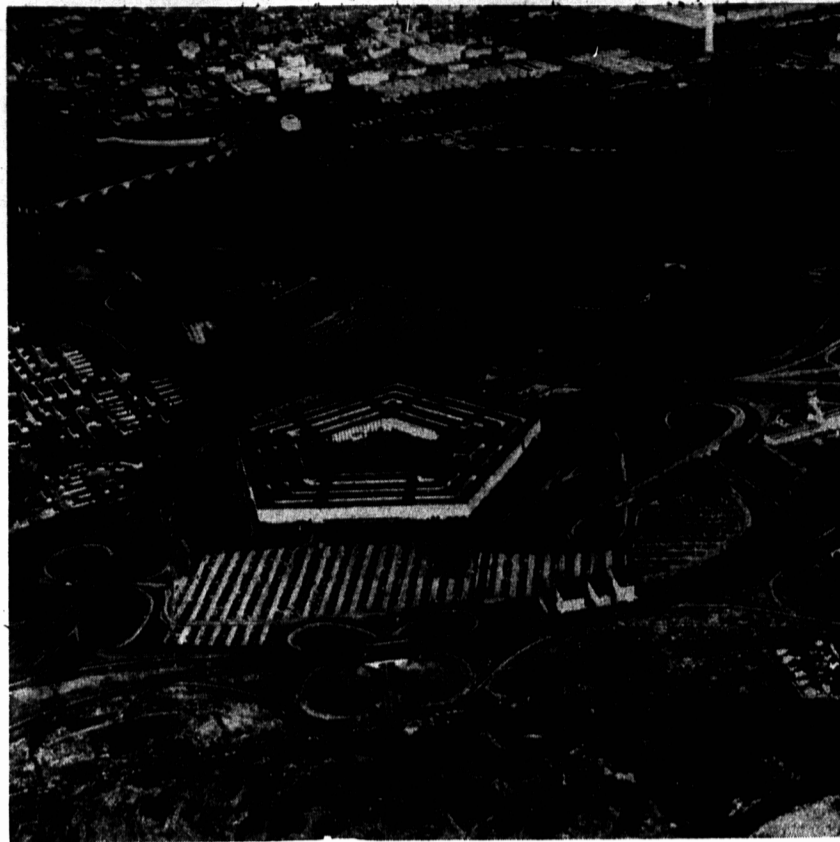
Mr. Lorne Johnstone, O'Leary, is making preparations to have a house built and has started digging the cellar. This house will be near his father's residence on the O'Leary road.

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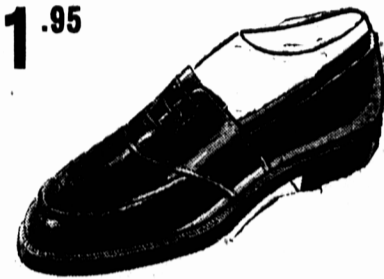
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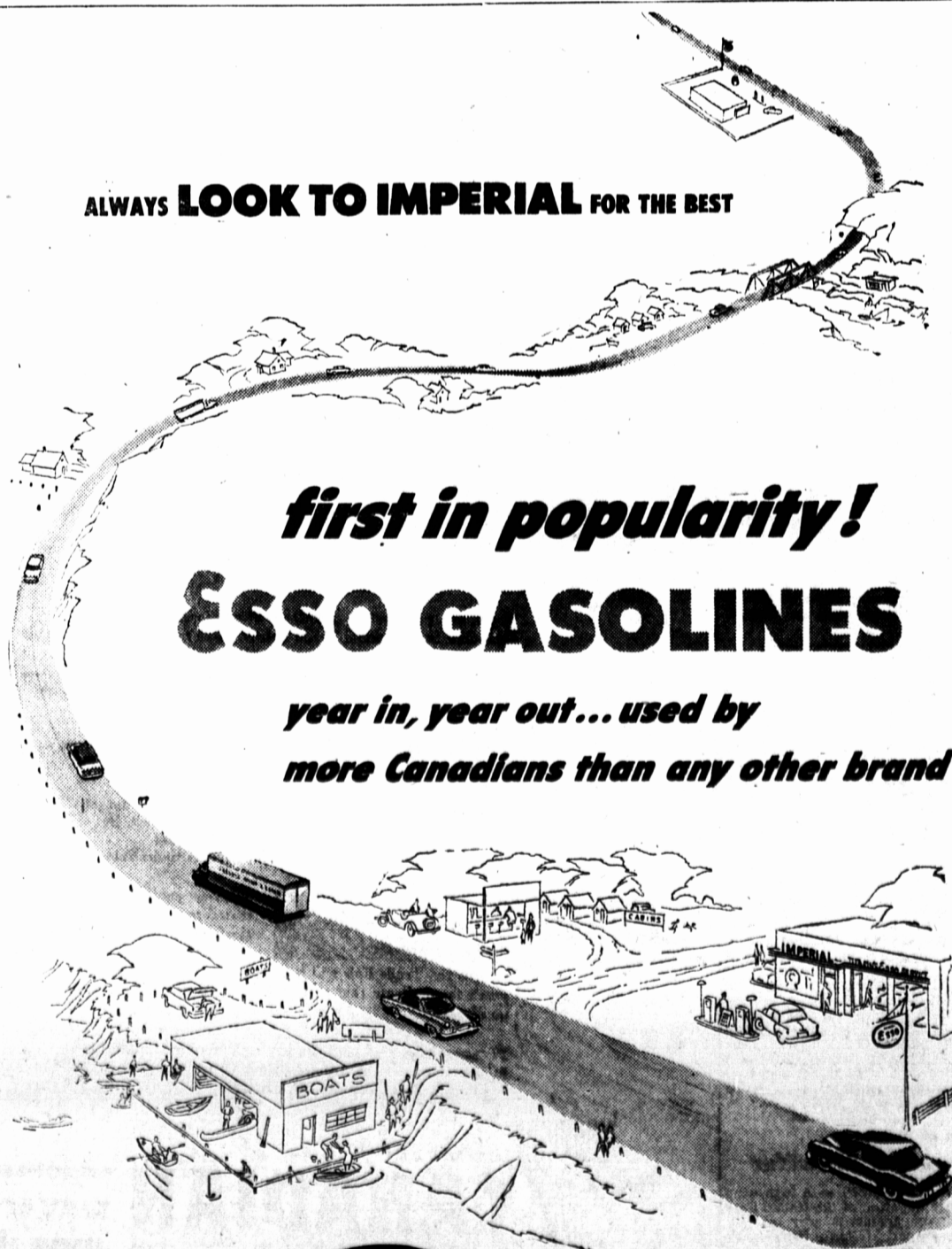
