Hopes To Get France Out Of Red Shortly

ANNECY, France (AP)—Premier Pierre Mendes-France says he hopes soon to get France out of the red in foreign trade and make her independent of American economic aid. "By 1955 France should re-establish the equilibrium of its foreign exchange and its balance of payments without foreign aid," the premier said Sunday. However, he said American assistance still would be necessary to maintain France's military machine. The premier did not refer to the forthcoming London conference on West German rearmament, but he has long considered this problem closely connected with the strength of the French economy. He feels that the French Assembly would reject German rearmament less dis-tasteful if France was stronger economically. Speaking at the opening of the annual Anancy Industrial Fair here leaving for London, Mendes-France said the restoration of France's balance of payments should be made "through her own efforts" by 1955—which would mean he plans to institute some sharp changes in France within the next four months. But France will not reduce her imports, he said. TO INCREASE SUBSIDIES Referring to the United States, Mendes-France said military aid from "a more powerful ally and friend" is normal as long as France has "to assume responsibilities not in conformity with her strength." But, he said, "we cannot count upon outside help to fill the gap of our balance of trade payments." To boost France's production, he said, the government has in mind granting subsidies for modernizing equipment, developing agricultural research, organizing farm markets and offering better conditions for industrial output. "It will be necessary," Mendes-France said, "to favor the production of agricultural items which we now have to import in large quantities."

Police Seeking

The son went to a theatre Friday night, reached home about 10:30 p. m. and went to bed in the room he shared with his mother. They said the husband, an unusually heavy smoker, occupied another room because cigarette smoke annoyed his wife. Police said neither the son nor the uncle could tell them whether Mrs. Lipowecy's reached home safely after leaving work shortly before midnight. The husband, a glass washer in a hotel beverage room, told police he and his wife, both originally from the Ukraine, came to Canada from Europe in February, 1952. They had lived for a time in Germany. Friends described the victim as a quiet woman who worried about purse-snatchers.

STRIPPED IN ALLEY

Police found combs from Mrs. Lipowecy's hair, her green shoes, pieces of clothing including a green plaid skirt and other personal articles scattered along the way from her home to the alley. She expressed belief she was dragged or carried to the alley. A police theory is that her attacker stripped the body in the lane and stuffed most of the clothes into a nearby garbage can. The woman's purse, with no money in it, was found in the can. Among Mrs. Lipowecy's personal belongings at her home, police said they found a picture of Mrs. Lipowecy standing in the embrace of a Nazi troop leader. They said it apparently was taken during the Second World War.

Former Guerilla

Vlaho says Vice-Admiral E. R. Mainguy, Canada's naval chief of staff, and Rear-Admiral H. F. Pullen, former commanding officer at Stadacona, made it possible for his family to come to Canada. Now that they're here, Vlaho says, "I'm very content. Everyone has been very kind." He thinks he'll be sent to Vancouver for a course after Christmas. "That will give Maria and Doris a good chance to see Canada."

Says Yanks Cannot Risk Defence Gamble

WASHINGTON, (AP)—State Secretary Dulles said Saturday night Americans "cannot afford to gamble" their safety and survival on defence programs which fall to assure genuine security. His statement, released in advance of his departure for London for a conference on how to bring West Germany into the Western defence alliance, was taken as a warning to France that if Germany is not rearmed with French co-operation, the U.S. will have to consider alternative security plans. Dulles is due in London today. The nine-power conference of Canada, Britain, the U. S., France, Italy, Luxembourg, The Netherlands and Belgium begins Tuesday. "Most Americans have come to realize that it is no longer possible to turn back the clock and seek security through isolation. We also know that we cannot afford to gamble our safety and our survival on arrangements and programs that have no reasonable prospect of providing genuine security." He said he is looking for the European nations themselves to take the lead in working out new plans to deal with the German problem. "We take with us no specific proposals of our own," he said, adding that the United States has been "encouraged" by the initiative taken so far by Britain and France.

Large Attendance At Scout Camps

More than 41 per cent of the Boy Scout population in the Province attended the various camps during the past season, which is a new record in Scout camp activities. 452 boys piled up a total of 3,224 camper days at Camp Buchanan, Crapaud, Fernwood, Casumpce and Sunny Brae, N.S. The groups represented in the various camps were from Trinity United Scouts, Trinity and St. James Cubs, St. Paul's Scouts and Cubs, Holy Redeemer and East Royalty Scouts, Summerside district Scouts, Provincial Scout Camp, Summerside district Cubs, Charlottetown district Cubs, Alberton Scouts, Holy Redeemer Cub Camp and Troop Scouters Gilwell at Sunny Brae, N.S. Following close on the activities of the summer, a training course for Pack Scouters will be held at the English Church Youth Centre, Crapaud during the week-end, Oct. 16-17. Cubmasters and their assistants will also take this course. The usual Apple Day activities on the Scouts is scheduled for October 30th. The big event in the immediate future, however, for the organization is Scout and Cub Athletics Day, Saturday, Oct. 2 at Memorial Field, with the first of 21 events being called at 2 p.m. Contests will range from short dashes for the 8 and 9 year old Cubs, to the more strenuous events by Scouts of 16 years and over. COACHES CAUSED SINKING

Kydo news service gave this sketchy account on the ferry tragedy: The 4,300-ton Toya Maru, which piles between northernmost Hokkaido and the main island of Honshu, was carrying 1,127 passengers and some 40 rail coaches. On its 150-mile run between Aomori on Honshu and Hakodate on Hokkaido, the ferry took shelter outside Hakodate harbor. The rail coaches slipped to one side and the ferry overturned. Huge wind-churned waves battered it. Aichi said 200 bodies were recovered and hundreds of others were feared dead. Radio station NHK, which has radio contact with Hokkaido, said only 40 persons from the ferry were definitely known to have got safely to shore.

FOUR BIG SHIPS LOST

Asahi reported that these four ocean-going ships are known to have been sunk off Hokkaido: Hidaka Maru, 3,000-ton passenger ship, number of passengers and crew not immediately known. Dai Satsu Maru, passenger ship, number of passengers and crew not immediately known. No. 3 Shinsai Maru, 5,000-ton freighter, number of crew unknown. Tokachi Maru, 3,000-ton freighter with a crew of 75. Early reports said eight had been saved and the rest were missing. The No. 16 Seikan Maru was reported sending out an SOS. The newspaper Yomiuri said an American LST landing ship-tank believed carrying U. S. troops from Hokkaido to Honshu, was wrecked. It had no other details. Prior to the Hokkaido fatalities, Japanese police had reported to Asahi that the typhoon's toll on islands to the south Sunday was: 43 dead, 82 missing, 371 injured, 1,572 houses destroyed, 511 boats and ships sunk and many other houses and ships damaged.

TOKYO BARELY TOUCHED

The typhoon swept through South Japan Saturday and Sunday, then moved north over the Sea of Japan. It slammed into the southern area from the Pacific swiftly, causing widespread destruction although only brushing Tokyo. When it passed Honshu Island, the typhoon was believed to be harmlessly dissipating. But it swung in toward Hokkaido and dealt a devastating blow Sunday night. Because forecasters said this typhoon, the 15th of the year, was not as strong as earlier ones, precautions taken had not been so extensive. Two typhoons earlier this month killed 93.

The bride wore a white dress, designed in the new Dior curve-restricting "H-style," and a white hat for the Protestant religious ceremony which followed a civil marriage at nearby Buochs Friday. Miss Hepburn's mother, Baroness Ella Anthonisz, was among a small group of friends and relations who flew to Switzerland from London for the service. Miss Hepburn and Ferrer recently appeared together in the Broadway hit "On dine." She won an Antoinette Perry award for her work in that production only two days after winning an Oscar as the star of the motion picture "Roman Holiday."

FIRST MARRIAGE

It was the first marriage for the captivating 24-year-old Motion Picture Academy Award winner. Ferrer, 37, has been married before.
