Interment took place on April 21 in Holy Cross cemetery, Halifax.

\$200 Fine Imposed For Selling Liquor

SUMMERSIDE — A fine of \$200 and costs was imposed on James Finnan of Duvar when he appeared before Magistrate W. Chester S. MacDonald in Prince County Magistrate's Court yesterday on a charge of unlawfully selling liquor from his residence.

Charged with stealing a quantity of firewood valued at less than \$50, Frederick Phillip Cotton, Springhill, Irwin Edwin Essery, Mt. Pleasant, and Leeman Foster Wagner, Conway, were each fined \$50 and costs or 30 days.

Cotton and Essery had entered guilty pleas at a previous hearing while Wagner had pleaded not guilty. Wagner changed his plea to guilty.

Magistrate MacDonald ordered the three accused to make restitution to Lorne Inman, Springhill, owner of the wood, to the amount of \$1 each.

Asked why the wood had been stolen, Mr. Wagner said "we were all drinking and we had ran out of money." He said they had seen this wood in a lane

where the vehicle in which they were occupants was being turned and decided to take some to sell for more liquor.

In passing sentence Magistrate MacDonald said he failed to understand why the three accused should commit such an act for so small an amount, especially Cotton and Wagner who had no previous criminal records. "Now," the Magistrate told them, "this record will remain with you for the rest of your life."

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Tignish Arts Foundation Getting Press Recognition

A summer school offering courses in painting, music and conversational French will open at Tignish for the first time this year from July 5 to August 15.

The summer school is a project of the newly formed "Tignish Arts Foundation" which aims to present a number of interesting cultural activities to people of the village. The venture is considered of worthy enough importance to be given good coverage in a large Montreal newspaper.

The foundation is the brainchild of Reginald Porter, ex-Tignish resident and now a third year student at Loyola College in Montreal. Mr. Porter requested Mrs. Elizabeth Cran, classics lecturer at the college, to visit the Island with a view to starting such an experiment.

Taking Tignish as a typical

Island village, she was convinced something should be done to develop the lore of the Maritimes, says the Montreal paper.

Mrs. Cran says Islanders should learn to take part in their own living culture, and the projects of the foundation are geared to enrich community life.

For the next four or five summers, the foundation will experiment with new projects, gradually adding to courses as growth is seen. The program is aimed at persons between 15 and 25.

Educational research will be done by Mrs. Cran, and she hopes to discover a pattern of learning that can be used in other less developed areas of Canada.

A long term aim of the school is the promotion of tourist interest.
