

Boston Shades Leafs 3-2; Canadiens & Detroit Tie

Detroit goalie Glen Hall performed brilliantly Saturday night as the Red Wings and Montreal Canadiens battled to a 1-1 tie and failed to break their deadlock for second place in the National Hockey League.

Meanwhile Boston Bruins edged Toronto Maple Leafs 3-2 to strengthen their grip on first place. The Leafs remain mired in fifth spot. In the game at Montreal Hall was peppered with 38 shots by the Canadiens who staged a great offensive show in a bid for victory. Both goals came in the first period. Ted Lindsay scoring for Detroit and Ben Olmstead for Montreal.

SPORTS BIG GAINS

Hall's outstanding work frequently drew applause from the crowd of 3,928 who saw him almost single-handedly throttle the Montreal power play time and again. His big saves came on shots from Maurice and Henri Richard, Jean Beliveau, Dickie Moore and Doug Harvey.

Goalie Jacques Plante of Montreal was equally as effective but had only 22 shots to handle. Plante robbed Red Kelly of a goal in the first period and in the third when the Red Wings shot out Canadiens, saved sensationally on goal bids by Bill Dineen and Metro Prystai.

Lindsay's goal came while Montreal was short-handed. Alex Delvecchio moved in on Howe's relay and then sent a goalmouth pass to Lindsay who poked the puck behind Plante. Olmstead scored 16 seconds later, getting the puck from Beliveau on a faceoff in the

COSTLY VICTORY

In the game at Toronto, peppery Leo Labine, a six-year man with the Bruins, scored twice and right winger Larry Regan, talked out of retirement last season by Quebec Aces, sank the winning goal at 7:25 of the third period. The Leafs' marksmen were wingers Bob Pulford and Ron Hurst whose second-period goals hauled Toronto into a temporary 2-2 tie.

The Boston win was costly. Rookie centre Jack Caffery, a former Toronto junior, suffered strained ligaments in his right leg early in the penalty-filled first period and may be out of action from three to six weeks. He was carried off on a stretcher.
