The Bond Terms Re-Read.

Mr. Reid must return the telegraph lines to the colony, and must amend his land grants so that no settlers are dispossessed of their homesteads, and he must give satisfactory guarantees as to the amount of mortgage money which he will invest in favor and the development of the colony.

Mr. Reid also hopes to come to a satisfactory arrangement with Mr. Reid for the colony's resuming ownership of the railway. Mr. Reid remaining for 50 years his operating contract.

The premier hopes that Mr. Reid will recognize from the result of the elections the wisdom of conceding the reasonable demands of the colony, and thus obviating the necessity for the government in introducing legislation at the coming session to give effect to these demands, to which alternative the government will be obliged to resort if Mr. Reid is obdurate.

Mr. Bond has also intimated that the government is considering a measure which will disqualify the employees of Mr. Reid or any other contractor for membership in the legislature, basing such enactment upon the number of Mr. Reid's employees who have contested districts in the recent elections.

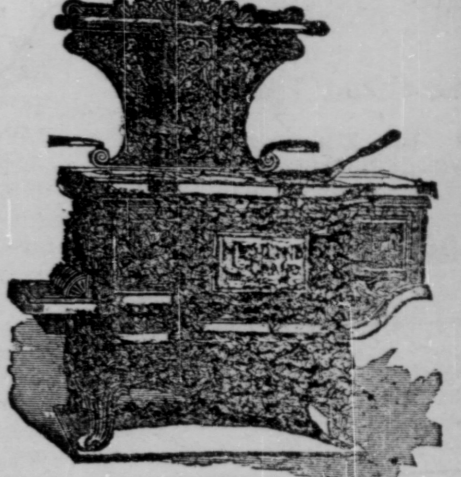
