STALLION ENROLMENT

According to the provisions of the Stallion Enrolment Act all stallions two years old and over, standing for service in this province, must be enrolled in the records of the Department of Agriculture. Horses offering for service must be inspected and graded and carry an inspection certificate. Applications for enrolment and inspection should be made immediately.

The required fee of Two Dollars (\$2.00) should be enclosed with each application for enrolment and should include name of horse, breed, age, colour description and registration number, if horse is registered.

Stallion owners who use horses for service not enrolled or inspected, or in grades not authorized by the Act will be subject to the penalty provisions of the Act. Only horses enrolled, graded and authorized by the Department of Agriculture will be permitted to travel for public service. All horses that have graded "out" will not be permitted to stand or travel for service.

U.K. Automobile Shipments Up

LONDON (AP)—Automobiles worth \$7,300,000 (\$20,550,000) were shipped to Canada by British manu facturers during the first quarter of 1962.

Statistics published by the Society of British Motor Manufacturers and Traders show British car exports totalled \$56,500,000, with more than \$12,000,000 worth going to the United States. The U.S. total was five times greater than in the same period of 1961.

Shipments to Canada, the European Free trade Area and the Common Market doubled.

Fashion Model Once Man Has Romance With Peer

By PATRICIA CLOUGH LONDON (Reuters) - April Ashley, fashion model and nightclub star who was once a man, Sunday confirmed reports she planned to marry into the British aristocracy as a she poured champagne for reporters on her 27th birthday.

April, who was celebrating her birthday at a friend's apartment here, named as her future husband Arthur Corbett, 42-year-old son of Lord Rowallan, former chief Boy Scout of England, and now governor of Tasmania.

Corbett owns Jacaranda, a luxury nightclub in Marabella, Spain, frequented by international celebrities and aristocracy. He was previously married to Eleanor Mackie, daughter of the king Sir Peter Mackie. They have four children.

Mrs. Corbett was granted a decree nisi last month on grounds of her husband's misconduct. The divorce becomes final July 17.

HEAVILY MADE UP April, tall and graceful, was heavily made-up and sported a turquoise turban, jangling jade earrings, an oatmeal suit and frilled pink blouse as she posed for photographers.

April, who was born in Liverpool as George Jamieson, son of a sailor, said: "I have been hiding from the press for six years, but now I have decided to talk and then maybe they will leave me alone."

Miss Ashley, who has already been offered a contract with a London nightclub, said she "hesitated for a long time before I agreed to marry Arthur and I am already frightened about what people will say and what it will be like to be Lady Rowallan with a background like mine."

During the last six months April has lived in a villa Corbett gave her near Marabella. She said: "I do not know when we will get engaged but certainly not until the divorce is absolute."

"I want to have a long engagement because I must be quite sure about it and I want it to be my only marriage."

She said she would give up work after her marriage and "probably adopt some children."

As George Jamieson, April ran away to sea at the age of 15 and became a cabin boy. Later as a woman she sang and danced in nightclubs throughout Europe and then took up modelling with top fashion houses until the secret of her sex-change leaked out and put an end to her career.

In 1960 she underwent an operation in Casablanca which finally completed the sex-change.

London's mass-circulation Sunday newspapers gave the story big play. April was quoted by the People as saying "Arthur is the first serious boy friend I have had since I changed my sex but I know he is the one for me."

The News of the World quoted the Eton-educated former London public relations man as saying: "The friendship between myself and April Ashley is a dreadfully deep and personal thing. I won't have it vulgarized. I'm even afraid to talk much about it and I'm scared something could go wrong."

The Rowallan family title was given to Corbett's grandfather in 1911. The present baron had a distinguished record in both world wars when he served with the Royal Scots Fusiliers.

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
