In years past a great tendency to consider a school trustee as a tax collector and administrator of school finances has dominated the minds of ratepayers, hence forgetting the important role he should exercise in planning the physical structure of our education system.

The duties and responsibilities of a trustee are twofold, administrative and pedagogic, nevertheless the first part cannot exist without the proper functioning of the second part.

## President Has Wide Powers In Pakistan

**KARACHI (Reuters)** — President Mohammed Ayub Khan has announced a new constitution for Pakistan giving the president wide powers and outlawing political parties.

The new constitution, laid out by Ayub Khan in a nationwide radio broadcast, sets up a presidential system of government with a one - chamber national legislature elected by an 80,000-member electoral college.

The system will replace the parliamentary form of government Pakistan inherited from Britain when it became independent in 1947, but not in operation since Khan assumed virtual one-man rule in 1958.

Ayub said the presidential form of government will be simpler and "more akin to our Indian and history."
