

Derby Winner Kauai King Leads Pack In Preakness

BALTIMORE (AP) — Kauai King, winner of the Kentucky Derby, came from off the pace Saturday to win the \$181,500 Preakness and move to within one victory of racing's triple crown for three-year-old thoroughbreds.

Taking the lead with about one-eighth of a mile to go, the Maryland-bred son of Native Dancer-Sweepin charged to the wire for a 1 1/4-length victory over Stupendous. Amberoid was another 4 1/2 lengths back for third place in the field of nine.

Fourth was Rehabilitate, ridden by Ron Turcotte of Grand Falls, N.B.

Kauai King, owned by Michael J. Ford of Omaha, Neb., needs only a victory in the Belmont Stakes June 4 to become the first triple crown winner since Citation did it in 1948.

The victory in the 91st Preakness, run on a bright, sunny day before 36,114 fans, was worth \$129,000 and boosted the king's bankroll for the year to \$369,027.

Kauai King jumped out in front at the start, just as he did in the Kentucky Derby. But Stupendous, from Mrs. H.C. Phipps, Wheatley Stable, took after him and shortly after they had gone one-quarter of a mile Stupendous went ahead under the guidance of Braulio Baeza-Don Brumfield, 20-year-old Kentuckian, up on the King, made no effort to regain the lead as Stupendous went the first six furlongs in 1:10 3/5. As much as two lengths separated them down the back stretch, with Blue Skyer and Indulto closest in pursuit.

With one-half mile to go, Brumfield made his challenge. He moved to within a length of Stupendous rounding the bend, was even at the quarter pole and then moved in front.

After Stupendous had reeled off a sizzling early pace, the mile was clocked in 1:26 2/5 and Kauai King hit the finish line in 1:55 2/5. The record of 1:54 3/5 for the 13-16 miles was established by Nashua in 1955.

deus, who has failed three times to beat the King, paid \$3.60 and \$3.40. Amberoid, owned by Reginald Webster and ridden by Bill Boland, paid \$3.80 to show.

Back of the first three horses in order came Rehabilitate, Indulto, Advocate, Exceedingly Understanding and Blue Skyer.

Advocate and Blue Skyer were the big disappointments since they had finished two-three respectively behind Kauai King in the Derby.

"When Stupendous started to run with me, I wasn't worried one bit," Brumfield said. "I didn't lay a stick on the King or say a word until going around the final turn, when I gave him a couple of cracks with the whip and he took off."

Second place was worth \$30,000, third \$15,000 and fourth \$7,500.

Cassius Clay Cuts Cooper Retains Heavyweight Title

LONDON (CP) — Cassius Clay opened a huge gash over Henry Cooper's eye and stopped the British challenger midway in the sixth round Saturday night for the fourth successful defence of his world heavyweight boxing championship.

For five rounds the sleek champion from Louisville, Ky., toyed with the Cockney grocer. But early in the sixth he lashed out with a thudding one-two combination.

Blood began gushing from above Cooper's left eye and referee George Smith stopped the scheduled 15-rounder. The time was one minute, 38 seconds of the sixth.

It was a repeat of Clay's victory over the plodding Englishman June 18, 1963, when Cassius came back from a fourth-round knockdown and won in the fifth.

It was the 19th knockout and the 24th pro victory for the unbeaten heavyweight champion. It also marked the seventh time Cooper had been stopped in a career dating to 1954.

A sellout crowd of 42,000 watched the bout — the first heavyweight fight billed as a world title match in England in 58 years — in the outdoor Arsenal Soccer Stadium.

FORCED IT EARLY

British boxing fans, who haven't had a heavyweight champion since Bob Fitzsimmons reigned briefly before the turn of the century, had high hopes when Cooper, fighting from a flat-footed stance,

forced the fight in the early rounds.

Moving in grimly and throwing his only dangerous weapon, a left-hand hook, Clay several times with solid hits. But Clay took them with hardly a flinch and almost insolently danced away.

The Associated Press scorecard gave Cooper the first two rounds, called the third even and gave the fourth and fifth to Clay.

From the start, Cooper acted like a man who had to win in a hurry or not at all. Clay either blocked or ducked under most of the left hands which Cooper threw.

The Englishman connected with a sharp combination in the second round and bounced two lefts off Clay's head, but the champion wasn't concerned.

Clay seemed to be pacing himself in the early rounds. Skipping around the ring counter-clockwise, he flicked out with his strong left hand. He reddened the Briton's face but brought no immediate blood.

Chance Abbe and Edgewood Hedrick combined for a daily double payoff of \$118.90. Other pays were small.

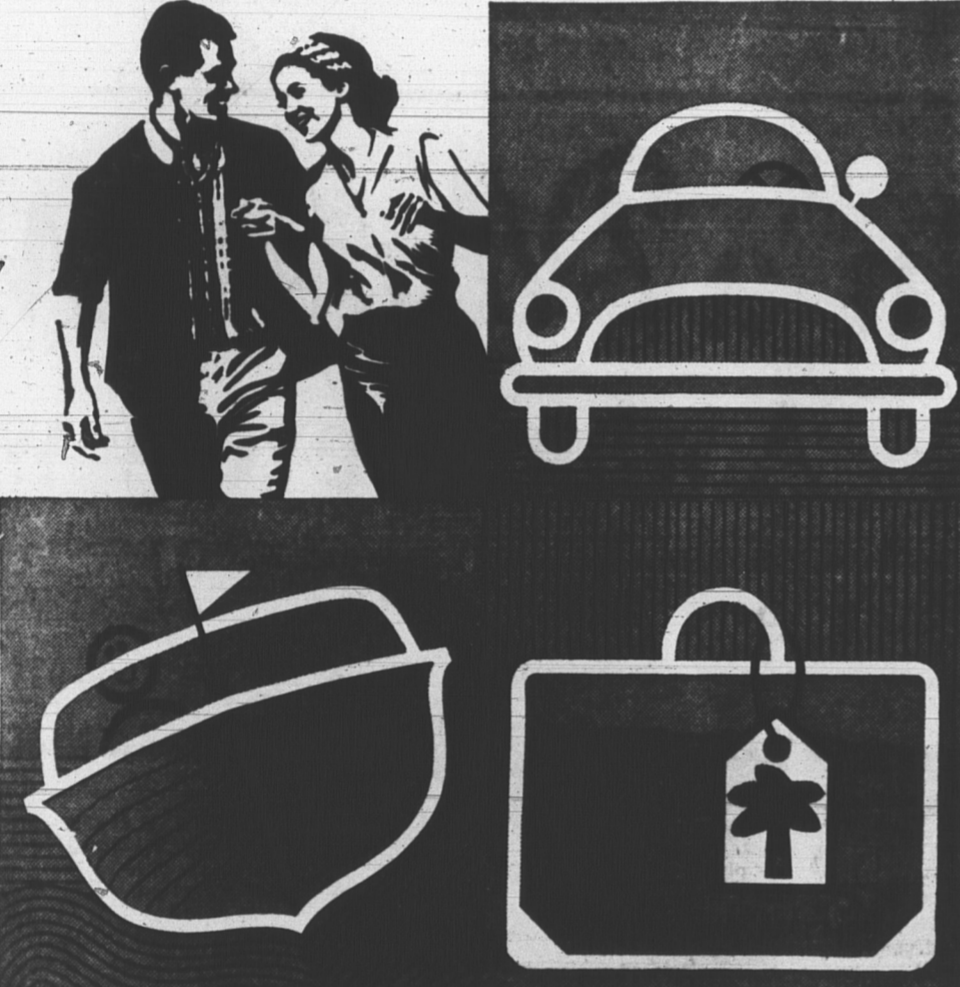
TRURO (CP) — West River April and Dee's Boy opened the 1966 harness racing season here Monday with double victories on an eight-dash card.
