**W**HEREAS the General Assembly of this Island stands prorogued until Tuesday, the Twenty-fifth day of June next. I have thought fit, by and with the advice of Her Majesty's Executive Council, further to prorogue the said General Assembly, and the same is hereby prorogued until THURSDAY, the First day of AUGUST next, of which all persons concerned are required to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.
