Annual Meeting Names Officers

Following the business part of the meeting the parents adjourned to the classrooms to discuss the program of studies and the principles of individual subject teaching with the teachers. The library was also visited. A lunch was provided by the Birchwood home economics department at the close of the meeting.

Fisheries Minister Releases Appointment

Honorable Cecil A. Miller, minister of fisheries, today announced the appointment of David Woronecki as fish biologist to the staff of the fish and wildlife division of Prince Edward Island. Mr. Woronecki graduated from the University of Connecticut with a degree in Wildlife Management in 1964. He later attended Graduate School at the University of Massachusetts where he obtained a Master's Degree in Fishery Biology in September of this year. During the following year, Mr. Woronecki was employed with the Connecticut State Board of Fisheries and Game, as a fish biologist. Mr. Woronecki will be employed in the Canada Land Inventory Project presently being carried out in the Province by the Fish and Wildlife Division under a Federal-Provincial agreement. One special area that he has been assigned to study is the effects of small dam and spillway construction on the seasonal migration of trout. Mr. Woronecki and his wife Susanne have taken up residence in Charlottetown.

Mr. Shaw has been a member of the brigade for a number of years. Kenneth Clements was also appointed as deputy chief of the brigade. Other changes in the brigade in recent weeks included the appointment of Ralph Beck to fill the position as chief due to the vacancy created when Chief Douglas Coffin took as Provincial Fire marshal. Mr. Beck also comes to his post with a number of years experience in fire fighting. The council set the amount of \$300.00 for each of the two new positions for this volunteer service which will possibly terminate after one year if deemed necessary, for a change. Chairman of the fire committee, Councillor Frank Greene advised that the tender of McGowan Motors for the new fire truck in the amount of 10,005.00 had accepted. This was the lowest tender and the truck is now on order. Mayor B.H. Yeo gave a brief resume of the mayor's convention.
