CRICKET.

To poor fielding on the part of the home team may, in a measure, be attributed their loss to New Glasgow yesterday. Several times the Nova Scotians gave lines, but our men were either too slow to accept the chance or failed to hold the ball as it sped on its downward course. This was notable, so in the first innings of the visitors, when Couway, with then but three runs to his credit, popped up a high fly which dropped directly into one of our fielders hands but passed through. He gave no more such chances, however, and ran up 31 runs before being retired. His contribution alone equalled almost half New Glasgow's total score. Chances to retire batsmen on flies were also given in the visitors second innings but apparently disliked to do a little sprinting rendered null and void the connection which might easily have taken place between bat and fielder. The visitors, on the other hand, were active in the field, accepted every chance, and were ever on the alert for more. Lennon, too, was unusually effective in his trundling. He is a splendid bowler, and one needs to have a quick eye to save wickets from his delivery. Our bowlers appeared a shade off colour, J. McQuillan not being nearly so deadly as is his wont. However, both elevens could not win, and this time the fortunes of war were against the Phoenix representatives. The score was as follows:

ZION CHURCH.—Rev. J. S. Sutherland will preach to-morrow.

GUN RETURNED.—The 40-pounder b. l. gun, which was sent from here to Halifax some time ago, has been returned.

TARGET PRACTICE.—The Engineers will hold their annual target practice on Monday afternoon, commencing at 1 o'clock.

THE IDA MAUD.—The brigantine Ida Maud, which has just discharged a cargo of coal for C Lyons & Co, sailed yesterday evening.

BAPTIST CHURCH.—Rev. J. A. Ford, of Eastport, Me., will preach at 11 a. m. and 7 p. m. tomorrow in the Baptist Church.

ROBBER.—A man named John Charlton, of North River, was at the police station this morning, complaining that he had been robbed on the way home last night.

A GOOD SPEAKER.—Mr. Buchanan roused the large audience to the highest enthusiasm by his presentation of the Prohibition "Pop tables."—Montreal Star.

GOSPEL MEETING.—In consequence of Mr. Buchanan's Prohibition meeting in the Opera House Sunday afternoon, the usual Gospel meeting in Wright's Hall will not be held.

GONE HOME.—The Arcadia, with the New Glasgow cricket team on board, left here about 6.30 p.m. yesterday. The team were "seen off" by our men, and cheers were exchanged by both sides.

POLICE COURT.—At the Police Court this morning a youngster named Doyle was charged with stealing a watch, owned by Mr. C. Howard Dingwell, from the house of Mr. Duncan McLean, Grafton St. The Stipendiary Magistrate sent the boy up to Supreme Court.

DANGEROUS.—Some small boys have been making a habit of practicing with a revolver on the Park Roadway of late. They have so far escaped the usual fate of the small boy, but their bullets have been striking near the neighboring houses. The boys should be looked after.

RAINFALL.—The rainfall thus far in the month exceeds that of the same period for the past three years. In 1896 up to the 20th of the month the precipitation was .81; in 1897, 1.69; this year it is 2.97. The humidity of the atmosphere has been exceptionally great, the rainfall being distributed in frequent showers. During the downpour last night .84 inches of rain fell.

"ELECTRIC" SPORTS.—This evening a striking competition on the machine on the market-square, will take place between the linesmen of the Royal Electric Co., the Full Electric Co., and the Telephone Co. This event will attract a large audience as the competitors are keen sports and their friends are legion. Betting, at present, is in favor of James Rush, of the Telephone Co., who as heavy-weight champion is expected to knock sparks out of the machine. The competition is the outcome of challenges hurled in mid-air from post to post during the transfer of wires to the new poles recently put up in Queen Street.

CONTRACT AWARDED.—There were four tenders sent in to the Commissioners for sewerage construction, from the following contractors: John P. Nicholson, Charlottetown; James E. McDonald, New Glasgow; T. A. McLean, Charlottetown; and McShaker Bros., Waltham, Mass. The tender of Mr. Nicholson was accepted. His figure was the lowest. The work of construction will probably begin next week, when the pipe is expected to be on hand. About 100 barrels of cement have already arrived. The tenders for the Manhole Covers was awarded to I. S. Matheson & Co., New Glasgow. Only one other tender for this work was received, and that was sent in by Mr. T. A. McLean.

W. E. M. U.—The Women's Baptist Missionary Union of the Maritime Provinces closed its fourteenth annual convention held at Truro this year after two days session. There were present 112 delegates from various parts of the Maritime Provinces. Last year's officers were re-elected, except that Mrs. David Price was elected vice-president for P. E. Island in place of Mrs. McHiggins. The receipts last year amounted to \$9,081, the greatest amount yet collected in one year, and leaving a small balance on hand. All the old missionaries are retained. Next year it is hoped two new missionaries will be added to the staff for work in India. Encouraging reports were received from home and foreign friends, and \$1,000 was voted towards the deficit in the foreign mission board funds. The next meeting will be in New Brunswick near some point selected for the meeting of the Baptist convention.
