MPs Hopeful Of Long Recess

By PAUL DUNN OTTAWA (CP) - MPs with their hearts set on a two-month summer recess had to settle Thursday for a three-day holiday weekend. Opposition demands for an immediate jump in the \$75-a-month old age pension to \$100 again blocked passage of the Canada Assistance Plan. The long recess is still expected to start some time next week but the assistance plan, still at the second reading stage, comes up first thing Monday. Other measures, including long-awaited revision of the Bank Act and a medical care insurance resolution, are still to be debated before the recess. On Thursday, MPs ignored all aspects of the assistance plan - which complements a variety of provincial health and welfare schemes - except a clause that provides additional cash assistance above the \$75-a-month old age pension for those who show need. NDP Leader T.C. Douglas and other members read letters from older constituents pointing out the difficulty of living on \$75 a month. Mr. Douglas said he understood Health Minister MacEachen wished to propose some additional measures to help the elderly. However, he wasn't going to allow him to speak because the minister would automatically, in accordance with Commons rules, close the debate. NDP WANTS DEBATE - The minister never did get to speak and there were still NDP members indicating a desire to speak when the Commons rose about 6 p.m. Health MacQuarrie (PC-Queens) scored the needs test which he saw as just another way of saying means test. It would subject the elderly to the "most intimate scrutiny of their lives." Margaret Bideout, parliamentary secretary to Mr. MacEachen, defended the assistance plan as reflecting the "general

approach" of recommendations by the Senate committee on aging. Noting the pressure for a higher old age pension, she pointed out the bill provides assistance to a much wider cross-section of Canadians than just the elderly. Mothers and children and the sickly would benefit under the bill's aid to provincial welfare schemes. The Commons approved, without debate, a resolution proposing establishment of a federal agency to regulate the livestock feed industry in Eastern Canada and British Columbia. The bill was given first reading.

Annual Anniversary Tomorrow

KENSINGTON - The Presbyterian Church in Kensington will celebrate its 90th annual anniversary tomorrow. At the morning service, Rev. E. H. Stein, Sydney, N.S., will be the guest speaker and Rev. J. S. McBride of Summerside will conduct the evening choir. Special music has been arranged by the choir for both services. The original opening of the sanctuary was on Christmas Day 1886. The first minister inducted in 1888 was Rev. J. M. MacLeod, born in Valfield, P.E.I. Up to that time the church was served by three neighbouring ministers from Malpeque, Long River and Bedouque. The present minister Rev. George Tannahill was inducted to the charge in November, 1964.

Large Barn Is Destroyed

The Montague Fire Department was called to the farm of Jacob Spin, Valleyfield, Wednesday evening. A large barn was destroyed and lost in the fire were 200 hens. With the help of a neighbor, Bill Capriani, Mr. Spin was able to move the following to safety: a school-bus, a tractor and a hay baler. The cause of the fire has not been determined. Mr. Spin said there was some insurance on the barn.
