Potato Growers Advised Re Treatment Of Pests

Colorado potato beetles are now present in many fields states the weekly potato Bulletin issued by the Science Service Laboratory, and they are laying eggs on the foliage. These eggs will hatch into the familiar red grubs or larvae in a few days. Flea beetles are beginning to disappear and this brood should be gone in another week. Webworms are also maturing and they should not be a problem on potatoes in another few days. DDT will control all these insects pests.

Mosquito-like Insects Are Cause For Annoyance

Swarms of "Midges" are causing a great deal of annoyance to a great many people at the present time. For several weeks now they have been noticed in the area North of Charlottetown. F.M. Cannon, officer in charge of the Entomological Laboratory, states that they breed in mud flats below fresh water ponds and dams. He states that many of them have been originating in the fresh water pond caused by the North River causeway.

1/2 Ct. Decrease In Fuel Oil

TORONTO — A decrease of half a cent a gallon in the price of light fuel oils including furnace and stove oil, kerosene and diesel fuel, was posted by Imperial Oil, Monday, throughout Quebec, the four Atlantic Provinces and most parts of Ontario.

The reduction applies immediately to the price paid by consumers for domestic furnace oil and diesel fuel. It will also apply to stove oil and kerosene prices paid by consumers who purchase directly from Imperial or its agents. In the Lakehead area the reduction will apply to areas normally served by Sarnia refinery, but not to areas which normally receive their light fuel oils from Winnipeg.

The decrease is chiefly due to a lower cost of tanker rates and a resultant decline in the wholesale price of fuel oils in the U.S. Gulf Coast and Great Lakes areas.

Federal Building. The angle parking was taking up too much of the width of the street. He suggested parallel parking was the answer. Councillor McCormac agreed and said he had suggested as much at previous meeting.

Councillor Frank O'Neill explained that parallel parking would not accommodate nearly as many cars. Councillor A. Gormley, Chairman of the Police Committee, agreed.

Finally it was agreed on suggestion of the Mayor that the situation should not be disturbed for several weeks in order that it may have a fair chance to see if it will work out satisfactorily. The Mayor added that he had never been personally in favour of the idea himself.

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LITTING OF STREETS
Councillor Johnstone complained that the city was not clean enough. This led to a discussion involving littering of streets by trucks and even by some car owners. City Recorder, K.M. Martin, said he had seen a car with an outside license plate on it being driven up the street by a man while a woman in the back seat opened the rear door and shoved out the litter that had been accumulated on the trip. Several spoke of the master of trucks driving through

the City spewing out litter in all directions.

It was agreed that stricter efforts should be made to control this practice.

The request of the City Employees Union to negotiate with the City was shelved for the time being until the case now under consideration at Summerside is settled. The Summerside union had been denied a similar request and their appeal is now being heard.

Mayor Stewart explained "He is awaiting until the outcome of the appeal at Summerside is known."

BUILDING PERMIT

The request for a building permit on the property on Weymouth Street known as the Horne property drew considerable comment. One faction insisted that the permit should not be granted. The other suggested that it should be granted.

The argument against the request was that it was a residential section and a commercial establishment should not be allowed. The other faction retorted that a commercial establishment had been operating there for many years. The interruption had been caused only by fire which damaged the premises.

Finally the City Recorder told the Council that they did not have the power to refuse the requests providing the proposed building met the building regulations.

Subsequently a resolution was passed authorizing the City building inspector to issue a building permit for the repair of the Horne building on Weymouth Street if the project is in accord with the building by-law.

Councillor O'Neill explained, that supervised swimming has been discontinued in the water at the end of the Brighton Road because of water pollution. Supervision is now being provided in the water by the bath houses along the Victoria Park driveway and a rescue boat will be available there.

The Red Cross is providing the supervision and it is being paid for by the City. Supervision is also being provided at the Wading Pool near the end of Brighton Road.

OTHER RESOLUTIONS
The other resolutions authorized the City clerk to issue a cheque to the Playgrounds Commission for \$1,000, that the City Clerk be authorized to issue a cheque to the Provincial Rifle Association for \$100, that the proposed installation of a marine terminal near Allen street involving a pipe line along the railway track to the Railway Wharf, be approved.

The purchase of two large tires and tubes from Whitlock Tire Service was approved. The payment of \$300 to the Red Cross Water Safety program was approved. Approval was also given to improvement of the lighting on Kent Street between Weymouth and Cumberland, on Cumberland between Kent and Fitzroy and at the intersection of Waverley Court and York Lane.

C. N. R. Holiday Specials To Roll

MONCTON — More than 100 Westerners now living in the Maritimes will be leaving on a holiday trip to their former homes this Saturday, and shortly afterwards former Maritimers will be leaving the West to holiday in eastern Canada. They will be travelling by the Canadian National Railways "Overlander" and "Bluenose" specials.

"Overlander" heading west, will be rolling out of Halifax on July 6 on the first leg of its annual, fun-filled cross country junket to Vancouver, and the "Bluenose" will leave Vancouver July 12 to come east.

The "Overlanders" will be making some interesting side trips during their tour, and will arrive in Edmonton on the morning of July 11 and in Vancouver on the morning of the following day.

Side trips for the party will include a tour of Quebec City and visits to Ste Anne de Beaupre and Montmorency Falls; a tour of Toronto and a visit to Niagara Falls. At Winnipeg they will tour the city and be guests at a reception in Assiniboine Park; and at Edmonton they will be guests of the Maritime Provinces Association of that city at a special breakfast in their honour.

Sponsored by the Canadian Maritime Provinces Association, the CNR "Overlander" and "Bluenose" tours are organized by Jackson V. Dodds, who will be accompanying the specials to ensure that arrangements work out smoothly, as will representatives of the CNR passenger department.

The special trains consist of air-conditioned sleeping cars, dining cars and a special coach fitted up for entertainment purposes. Movies are shown during the trip, and there is a playroom to keep the small fry happy.

741 Deaths In July 4 Weekend

CHICAGO (AP) — Final tabulation showed that at least 741 persons were killed in the United States during the long fourth of July holiday weekend in a variety of violent accidents—mostly traffic.

The traffic toll, however, came far below the prediction of 533 made by the National Safety Council.

An Associated Press survey of fatal accidents, covering the period from 6 pm Wednesday to midnight Sunday local times, showed there were at least 428 traffic deaths. Drownings claimed 216 lives and 99 others were killed in a variety of accidents.

STAGE MARCH

BERLIN (AP)—More than 5,000 West Berlin university students staged a silent demonstration Saturday against a scheduled slash in their government subsidies. They marched along the city's fashionable Kurfurstendamm Avenue and squatted in the street before a Berlin office of the West German federal government.

Queen Watches Son At Sports

LONDON (AP) — The Queen went to a London playground Monday to watch her eight-year-old son Prince Charles take part in his school's sports day.

She saw him make some lousy strokes in a cricket match and finish fourth out of nine in a 50-year race.

The young prince goes to a private boys' school near Buckingham Palace. The Queen attended with Charles' six-year-old sister Princess Anne.
