Team Officers Are Elected

The Prince Edward Island Baseball Association held a meeting at the offices of the provincial physical education department yesterday for the purpose of laying plans for the Canadian junior baseball tournament scheduled for Winnipeg July 28-August 2nd.

This will mark the first occasion that an Island representative has competed in a Dominion baseball tournament such as this. The Winnipeg competition will be under the direction of the National Federation of Amateur Baseball and all member provinces will be represented.

Officers for the Island team were elected at yesterday's meeting and are as follows: Rev. Don MacLennan, business manager, Mt. Stewart; John Kane, manager, Charlottetown and Hank Landry, coach, Summerside.

Charlie Ryan, Island delegate for the National Federation of Amateur Baseball has announced that the team is scheduled to start practicing Saturday.

Any juvenile or junior baseball player on the Island is eligible for a spot on the team, that will journey to the west. There is a tryout practice scheduled for all Prince County players for Summerside's Queen Elizabeth Park Saturday at 2.00 p.m.

On Monday at Charlottetown's Memorial Field at 6.00 p.m. all prospective members of the team from Queen and Kings County are invited to practice.

Following these two practices a regular practice schedule will be set up and the elimination process will begin. We think this an excellent opportunity for our junior ball players and should provide inspiration for all our minor league performers.

Tid Bits From Here And There

Jim Fox, city recreation director, has passed along word that a record number of youngsters were in attendance at Memorial Field, last Saturday, to register for the respective minor league leagues conducted by the city. Jim told us there were 244 youths on hand, which is approximately 70 more than turned out for the first day's registration last spring. Two Major Deals At NHL Meetings

MONTREAL (CP)—Two major deals were announced by four National Hockey League clubs late Tuesday immediately after the inter-league draft.

In the first, Montreal Canadiens traded goalie Cesare Maniago and centre Gary Peters to New York Rangers for four players and cash. The New York-owned players involved centre Earl Ingarfield, Gordon Labossiere, Noel Price and Dave McComb.

The amount of cash involved was not disclosed. Ingarfield played the full season, last closed with New York, Labossiere and Price were with Baltimore of the American Hockey League, and McComb played with St. Paul of the Central Professional Hockey League.

Toronto Maple Leafs and Boston Bruins formally announced completion of a deal whereby veteran Ron Stewart, Toronto right winger, goes to the Bruins in exchange for three players. Boston gave up Pat Stapleton, a defenceman, and forwards Orlando Kurtenbach and Andy Hebenstren.

Stapleton and Hebenstren played with Portland of the Western Hockey League last year and Kurtenbach was with the Bruins. Hebenstren formerly played with New York rangers and later with Boston before being sent to Portland a year ago.

Ten Are Elected To Hall Of Fame

MONTREAL (CP)—Ten former hockey players, several of whom were stars around the turn of the century, were named Monday to the Hockey Hall of Fame.

The 10 are: Arthur Farrell, who played with the old Montreal Shamrocks club more than half a century ago.

Fred Scanlon, also a former member of the old Shamrocks. Blair Russell, of the old Montreal Victorias.

Jack Marshall, who played with the old Montreal Wanderers.

Ernie Russell, another member of the Wanderers in the early 1900s.

Clint Benedict, goalie with Ottawa and Montreal Maroons some years ago.

Sid Howe, who came up through the Ottawa Primrose junior club and played with Ottawa, St. Louis and Detroit in the National Hockey League.

Marty Barry, who played with Boston Bruins, Montreal Canadiens and Detroit Red Wings in the NHL.

Red Herber, long-time defenceman with Toronto Maple Leafs.

Bill Mosienko, who was a forward with Chicago Black Hawks.

The 1964-65 schedule saw one goal scored on every 10.8 shots compared to one marker on 11.8 shots during the 1964-65 season. Last year in 1964-65 the six teams shot 13,076 times in all for a total of 1,208 goals. The previous season, 1,166 counters came from 13,724 tries.

Norm Ullman, Detroit Red Wings' All-Star centre, placed fifth on this year's accuracy list, but showed the most improvement.

Commissioner Joe Foss recommended expansion to the eight club owners, convened here for a two-day meeting.

Foss' pitch was for two new clubs in 1966 and two more in 1968. He said there was no discussion of expansion beyond Sept. 1, 1966.

Foss conceded that Philadelphia and Atlanta were among cities considered, but would say no more about the possible choices.

The commissioner said no group would be awarded a franchise at this current meeting and added that the club owners would hear no presentations from sponsors. He estimated there were close to 60 groups interested in obtaining a franchise.

National Hockey League Holds It's Annual Draft

MONTREAL (CP)—The National Hockey League wound up a day of friendly activity Tuesday with three deals involving a total of 12 players, two more claimed on waivers and an unusually heavy harvest of 12 more picked up in the inter-league draft from the minors.

Goalenders played a big part in the day's business. New York Rangers, a bit shaken by Jacques Plante's announcement of his retirement, grabbed Don Simmons and Cesare Maniago. Simmons, an experienced NHL goalie with Boston Bruins and Toronto Maple Leafs, was taken in the draft from the reserve list of Rochester of the American Hockey League.

Maniago, who has had flings in the NHL with Toronto and Montreal Canadiens, went to the Rangers in a Montreal-New York deal.

ON RESERVE LIST

At the draft meeting, New York asked waivers on Plante, and no NHL club was willing to spend the \$30,000 waiver price for him. His name was transferred to the reserve list of Baltimore of the American League.

SWAP DEFENCEMEN

Montreal and Chicago Black Hawks made a swap of young defencemen, Montreal trading Bryan Watson for Don Johnson. Toronto, in a deal with Boston, gave up 13-year veteran Ron Stewart for three players—Pat Stapleton, Orlando Kurtenbach and Andy Hebenstren.

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Scotty Morrison Is Made NHL's Referee In Chief

MONTREAL (CP)—Jan (Scotty) Morrison, whose small-size restricted his hockey playing to junior competitions, was named Tuesday as the National Hockey League's new referee-in-chief.

The 35-year-old native of Montreal, who took to refereeing in amateur hockey 15 years ago and moved up into pro ranks to serve two years in the NHL, succeeds Carl Voss.

Voss is retiring after 15 years on the job and has bought a home in Boca Raton, Fla. He will assist Morrison for the time being in the administrative work.

The announcement of Morrison's appointment, rumored for a week, was made by the NHL board of governors.

WORKED IN NHL

It was the burden of traveling that caused Morrison to give up NHL refereeing eight years ago. But he subsequently worked in the Western Hockey League, when he made his home in Vancouver, and again found himself traveling while working as field sales supervisor for a Toronto company.

He is back in business traveling again but plans to reserve his full summers for his family. He has five children—four girls and a boy.

"I love hockey and I'm thankful that Carl Voss will assist me in taking over the job," said Morrison.

Morrison's appointment is for one year. Termination of the agreement between himself and the NHL would require another year's notice.

UDVARI ALSO CONSIDERED

The man who had been rumored as a likely candidate, along with Morrison, was Frank Udvari, the league's No. 1 referee. It appears the league governors want Udvari to remain in that position, but there was speculation that with the likely expansion of the NHL within a few years, some dual or separate roles may be set up for the refereeing staff.

Morrison played four seasons of junior hockey in the Montreal area and then began refereeing in junior and intermediate leagues. He moved up to the old Quebec Senior Hockey League and in the 1952-53-54 seasons worked in the Western Hockey League.

His work attracted attention and the young referee was brought up to the NHL.

While engaged in other employment, he continued working in the NHL after leaving the NHL. He became referee-in-chief of the NHL in 1962. He returned to the NHL last season replacing George Hayes, who was dismissed for failure to take an eye examination.

Braves Beat Cubs

CHICAGO (AP)—Joe Torre broke a 2-2 deadlock with a pinch-hit home run in the 10th inning Tuesday and started the second-place Milwaukee Braves on a homer spree that produced an 8-2 victory over Chicago Cubs.

Torre's homer, his 13th of the season, came off Lindy McDaniel with Frank Bolling on base. Before the 10th ended, Felipe Alou, Hank Aaron and Gene Oliver also had scored six runs.

It was the first time a National League club had hit four homers in one inning since the Braves did it in June, 1961.

Ken Johnson, Milwaukee starting pitcher, gave up only three hits in six innings. Bob Sadovski pitched three hitless innings before Torre batted for him, and Billy O'Dell finished the job.
