Mining and Smelting are to spend \$10,000 within the next four months period on the properties of Ritchie Gold, Victoria Creek Gold and William J. Elliott. If the results are satisfactory a new company will be formed by Smelting and 1,300,000 shares issued to the vendors of which Ritchie Gold will receive 1,000,000 shares. The new company may option 666,662 shares at ten cents a share, 500,000 at twenty cents and 500,000 at thirty cents to Smelters.

Liquors Strong On Montreal Market

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) MONTREAL, July 29—Encouraged by strength of liquors, buyers raised their bids late in today's stock market and overcame early weakness. Utilities, constructions, papers and banks worked higher. Metals and rails were unsettled but losses were narrow. Observers traced demand for Ontario steel to publication of an improved year-end financial report. The preferred jumped 10 points to 95 while the common advanced four to 10. Seagrams firmed 1 1/2 points at 22 1/2 while "A" and "B" shares of Canadian Industrial Alcohol improved fractionally. Utilities swung up with minor gains for Ottawa Power, Montreal Power, B. C. Power, Shawinigan, Canada Northern Power, Power Corporation and Canadian Hydro-Electric Preferred. Brazilian at 12 1/4 and a few others showed minor losses.

Leaders Decline On N.Y. Exchange

By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, July 29—Profit-takers concentrated their fire on steels and motors today and, with the exception of favored specialties many recent stock market leaders joined the casualty list for declines of 1 to 2 or more points. Financial analysts attributed much of the selling pressure to so-called professionals who decided that a technical correction was overdue. Overnight study of the United States Steel Corporation statement brought expressions of satisfaction from most quarters, although there were some who seemed a trifle disappointed that the freely predicted \$1 net was not quite earned on the common stock.

PRODUCE

(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, July 29—Eggs and potatoes continued upward on Montreal open produce markets today while butter prices eased. Cheese was quietly steady. Butter was quoted at 23 1/2 cents per pound for carlots or less of no 1 while lots to retailers were 24 for solids and 24 1/2 for prints. Graded egg shipments in cartons or less were quoted at 27 1/2 to 28 cents a dozen for A large, 25 1/2 to 26 for A medium, 22 to 23 for B and 20 1/2 to 21 for C. New Quebec potatoes, no 2 grade sold at \$1.50 per 80 pound bag. Cheese was quoted at 13 to 13 1/2 cents per pound for Ontario white and colored.

Currencies

(Canadian Press) NEW YORK, July 29—Leading foreign exchanges continued to reflect uneasiness over the Spanish political situation today, although better support near the end kept losses on balance small. At one time the French franc was 80 3/8 of a cent off but recovered most of the loss to end 80 1/8 of a cent lower. The British pound sterling likewise rallied near the close to finish 1 1/4 cent improved and Holland and guilders came up to close .04 cent higher. Swiss francs were unchanged. Canadian dollars finished at par, up 1/8 cent yesterday.
