Manitoba Hopes To Make Record Muskrat Catch

By Dave Cross - (CP) - WINNIPEG, April 10 - (CP) - Manitoba's 10,000 trappers are on the hunt for the highest-paying fur-bearer in the north—the muskrat. But it's anyone's guess whether this will be a good or bad year. Officials of the provincial department of game and fisheries, fur-auction experts and retailers all agree that you can't predict the outcome of a trapping season. One provincial expert ventured that the muskrat catch "will be as good as last year." The 1949 crop was worth \$2,222,094. The muskrat season opened in some parts of northern Manitoba March 26 and in other districts April 1. Value of all furs last season was \$2,552,803—a decrease of 33 per cent from the previous year's \$3,794,701. Beaver continued to provide a large proportion of the trappers' livelihood. The harvest of 14,099 pelts was the highest in 26 years. The muskrat catch of 980,330 has only been surpassed once in the same period. Squirrel, muskrat, mink and beaver constituted more than 90 per cent of the total fur catch. The price the catch will bring is an open question. One retail store official said: "We can't tell what mink will want to wear. Her whims and fancies govern how much the trappers will get for a certain fur. And, if she doesn't want one type of fur, the trapper who has spent months of work, won't be able to sell at such a high price to fur traders." Fashions Change The trapper of long-haired fur, for instance, now is out of luck. Once-valuable fisher, marten, lynx and silver fox are no longer wanted. The red fox catch dropped from 23,043 pelts in 1942-43 to 2,836 in 1948-49. And, during the war, men who made above-normal salaries made gifts of costly furs. Today they can't afford it. An indication of the war-boom prices and the start of a decline is shown in the central Manitoba district. Trappers' earnings averaged \$1,136 last season, compared with \$1,686 in 1947-48. Practically all the area to be trapped this spring is under some form of government registration which controls fur-catches. It gives a trapper a certain area to trap, and he knows that if he traps all the available fur in one year, there won't be any left the next. Game officials say they are prepared for timber wolf and coyote depredations which caused concern in 1949-49. "The wolf seems to be near the height of its cycle, and bounties paid by this department were the highest ever recorded," one official said in his annual report. Bounties paid on 1,061 coyotes totalled \$5,256; on timber wolves \$11,180. With bears and beaver, total bounty was \$17,278. The royalty was drastically reduced in an agreement with Saskatchewan and Alberta.

Buying Centred In Selected Issues At N. Y.

NEW YORK, April 10 - (CP) - Buying enthusiasm centred in a few selected issues today in the stock market but didn't spread to the remainder of the list. Gains among the popular issues ran to more than 3 points while losses were confined to 2 points or less among the leaders. For the most part, however, changes were fractional. On average the market didn't move away from the bull market high attained last week. The Associated Press average of 80 stocks was unchanged at 76.1, a shade below the 1948 peak which in turn is the highest level since 1930. Total volume was 2,070,000 shares as compared with 2,000,000 shares on Thursday, the last previous full trading day. Chemicals appeared headed for higher ground, but they, too, faltered and closed irregularly over a 2 point spread. Radio-TV headed upward and then turned mixed. The industrial component of the Associated Press average was off .3 of a point, rails were unchanged and utilities advanced 2 of a point. Canada issues were higher with Canadian Pacific upward move of 7-8 making it the second most active issue on the market. Dome Mines and Hiram Walker each eased 1-8. Distillers Seagrams was unchanged. McIntyre was unquoted. The curb market hit a fast trading pace that pushed the volume to 630,000 shares, the highest since Nov. 3, 1948. Gains during the early part of the day were widespread. But they were cut back by the close. Some of the Canadian oils, steady gainers during the past week, stepped out but fell back. Imperial Oil closed unchanged at 25 while Imperial Oil (registered) advanced 1-2 to 25. Royalite ended at 13 3-8 up 1-2. Calgary and Edmonton also advanced. Lake Shore mines climbed 1-8. Giant Yellowknife was unquoted.

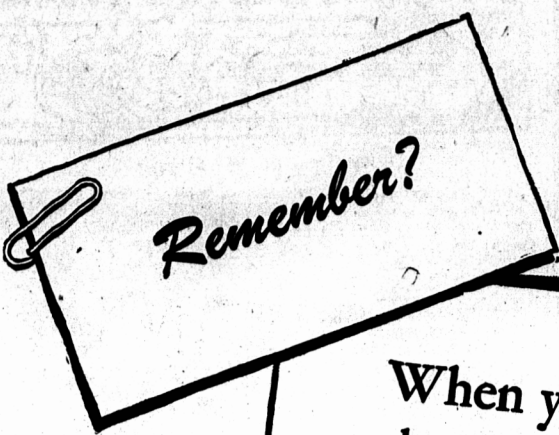
Threat Of Ford Strike Is Lessened

WINDSOR, Ont., April 10 - (CP) - The threat of a major auto workers strike here Wednesday over pensions appeared somewhat lessened tonight, labor observers report. Two new developments today led to a hint of agreement being reached soon between local 200 United Automobile Workers (C.I.O.) and Ford Motor Company of Canada Ltd., in their lingering pensions dispute. Walter P. Reuther, U.A.W. international president, unexpectedly attended a union committee meeting today. Reuther's headquarters are in Detroit. The second development was the union announcement of a special general membership meeting Tuesday afternoon when the 11,000 Ford auto workers are to be given a full report "on results of negotiations to date." The Tuesday meeting was called after union company officials has issued any statement. However, George Burt, Canadian U.A.W. director, said Saturday that "we are making substantial progress." The union's major demand is for \$100-a-month company-paid retirement pensions for auto workers at 65 after 25 years service. Ford has offered \$55 to workers at age 65 after 30 years and the company offer was approved by two-thirds majority report of an Ontario Conciliation Board.
